

JUST SAYING - What exactly does it mean to discern your vocation?

Because a vocation is a serious commitment of one's life to follow God's call, proper effort and care are required to determine what God's call is. This diligent consideration of what God is calling one to do is called vocational discernment.

Proper discernment requires a person to:

- know and understand oneself personality, strengths and weaknesses, inclinations, spirituality, mental ability, even physical health
- know, understand, and love our Catholic Faith understand the different vocations, what they entail, and what they mean for the lives of those who embrace them

This cannot happen instantaneously, so vocational discernment is not a quick and easy task. Once begun, it often takes months, and sometimes years to determine what route to begin. And once begun, it often takes years to determine the final answer to the question "what is my vocation?"

Thus, discernment requires study, prayer, and patience. And one cannot discern alone. The best way to discern is with help from the Church, ideally from a priest or someone trustworthy to help guide you. This spiritual director can help you to better understand yourself and where God is calling you. If you want any help discerning where God may be leading you – from simple guestions to more in-depth guidance – we can help!



Fr. Mike Polinek, Vocations Director

Wal-Mart to the Catholic Priesthood? Fr. Mike was a department manager of the sporting goods department at Wal-Mart. His plan was to work his way "up the ladder", but that all changed in February of 2001. Fr. Mike made a three-day retreat and had a powerful experience of God's love and mercy. He never had dreams of being a priest and he never thought much about God. But that was just the beginning of an unknown, life changing

path. Two months later, God revealed to Fr. Mike that a seminary was sitting on that path. A year and a half later, he entered St. Mark Seminary in August of 2002 and was ordained a Catholic priest eight years later, June 11, 2010, at St. Peter Cathedral in Erie, PA.

Fr. Mike was born and raised in Erie, PA. After graduating from McDowell High School in 1997, he went on to work in landscaping for the Diocesan Cemeteries and then began working at Wal-Mart in December of 1998. In 2002 Fr. Mike entered St. Mark Seminary and Gannon University and graduated in 2006 with a Liberal Arts degree. He continued his seminary studies at St. Vincent Seminary in Latrobe, PA and graduated with a Masters of Divinity degree in 2010.

As priest, Fr. Mike has served as parochial vicar at St. Joseph Church in Warren, PA and St. George Church in Erie PA. In February of 2015 he was named the Vocation Director for the Diocese of Erie and currently resides at St. Peter Cathedral. He also enjoys serving as Assistant Spiritual Director for the DME (Divine Mercy Encounter) Retreat Program.

The Most Rev. Lawrence T. Persico, bishop of Erie, has released the following information: David L. Poulson laicized On March 5, 2019, David Lee Poulson, formerly a priest of the Diocese of Erie, was notified by the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, and with the approval of the Holy Father, that he was granted a dispensation from all the obligations attached to holy orders (priesthood). Because Mr. Poulson has now been removed from the clerical state, he is forbidden to function as a priest in the Catholic Church and should no longer present himself as a priest and not be admitted as a priest in the celebration of the sacraments.
