PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioners,

The Work of the People The Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

October is traditionally known as the Month of the Rosary mainly because we celebrate the Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7. While the Rosary is actually a prayer for private devotion, it can be prayed in common. In the Rosary, with its sequence of prayers and mysteries, we contemplate the Gospel in company with the Blessed Virgin Mary. As St. Pope John Paul II wrote in 2002, "the Rosary . . . is a prayer loved by countless Saints and encouraged by the Magisterium. Simple yet profound, it still remains, at the dawn of this third millennium, a prayer of great significance, destined to bring forth a harvest of holiness. With the Rosary, the Christian people sits at the school of Mary and is led to contemplate the beauty on the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love."

In the reading from the second Book of Kings we hear part of the Elisha story. This brief passage about the healing of Naaman is rich with images. He plunges into the water seven times, a number that often denotes fulfillment. Although Naaman was an important figure, he traveled with "whole retinue," his leprosy would have placed him on the edge of the community. His healing brings conversion and thanksgiving, and a promise to worship the God of Israel.

The author of the second Letter to Timothy boldly proclaims that the "word of God is not chained." This statement is intended to give courage to those who will proclaim their own testimony of the Risen Lord.

In the Gospel, the healing of the ten lepers is another story in Luke's account that proclaims the intervention of God in the struggle of those who seek relief from human events. The narrative bears testimony to the compassion of God for those unjustly left on the edge of society through no fault of their own. But there is a concluding teaching for all of us: giving thanks for God's great love is also expected.

The reflection for this week is from Fr. Jerome Kodell, OSB who is former abbot of Subiaco Abbey in Arkansas.

Many retreat programs during recent years have adopted the practice of the Fourth Day, which was pioneered by the Cursillo Movement decades ago. The Cursillo is a three-day retreat; the "fourth day" is each and every day following as life unfolds. This idea arose because people who had felt their lives changed by a renewal experience often reported that without some kind of follow-up, the new enthusiasm and resolution faded away.

The cured leper Naaman was way ahead of the Cursillo Movement. He took soil from Israel back to his homeland to remind him of his healing and additionally to build a space for worshiping the true God who had healed him. So it was both a reminder of what he had received and an ongoing act of gratitude. We may be surprised that Elisha would not accept a gift from Naaman. But the prophet did not want to support the illusion that he himself was responsible for the cure. That came from God, and he was only the minister and messenger.

There is something refreshing in the whole Naaman-Elisha episode. We live in a time when people often can't see a new possibility because of a hardened prejudice, where some are taking credit for good they didn't do, and where others are ungrateful for what they have received.

Naaman overcame his prejudice against the rivers of Israel, and when he received healing and was looking for someone to thank, Elisha was humble enough to place the credit where it belonged.
