The Work of the People
The Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

With little fanfare, we move into August this weekend as we continue through Ordinary Time. I have not had the opportunity to experience what some call the "slowing down of life" this summer but there is still time to recharge for the business of the coming months. The Opening Prayer (Collect) for this Sunday points to how God constantly gives life to his creation: he creates, and he also restores what he creates and keeps safe what he restores. This is the reason we glory in our God as our "Creator and guide."

In the Reading from the Book of Exodus today God provides bread for the complaining people, but they don't know what it is. Happily, Moses could tell them. How often does God answer our prayers or meet our needs and we fail to recognize the gift being offered? Who has helped us see a gift in what at first appear to us to be strange?

In the Gospel reading today we continue Jesus's Bread of Life Discourse in John's Gospel. In the reading from the Book of Exodus today we hear of God feeding the people of Israel. The people following Jesus have just been fed. The message from John's account of the Gospel complements what we hear in the Reading from the Letter to the Church at Ephesus today. Jesus, who said, "My food is to do the will of the One who sent me," says that he himself can be our sustenance. Christ, in his message and in his living Body, is the heavenly bread God continues to send to us.

In the Letter to the Church at Ephesus we hear the author say: "You learned Christ," not "You learned about Christ." The knowledge the author is talking about here is comparable to the difference between knowing what a bicycle is and knowing how to ride one. To learn Christ means to let Christ so influence our heart and mind that others will know Christ by watching us. That demands a lot of practice.

"One thing I really like about the Bible is this: it is densely populated with imperfect people. People like me. And (I'm assuming) people like you. Take today's reading from Exodus. God has

just delivered the Israelites from their many years of slavery in Egypt. And God did it in an amazing way: by leading them smack-dab through the Red Sea—with dry feet, no less. But now the people are whining to Moses that their former way of life in Egypt was better than their current state of affairs. (How soon we forget!) The people complain. They grumble. Finally, to stop their whining, God sends quail and manna for them to eat. As I read this story, I asked myself: Can whining be a substitute for trust in God? Can complaining be a substitute for faith? Can grumbling be a substitute for action? I think they are for me at times.

St. Paul reminds the Ephesians, and us, of this important reality: discipleship with Jesus calls for continuous conversion. Continuous. What's more, conversion is hard work. It entails 'putting off the old self and putting on the new self.' No easy task. But Jesus gives us an incredible gift to help us with the work of continuous conversion: the Eucharist, the Bread of Life. Under the appearances of bread and wine, we receive Jesus himself, our nourishment and strength for the journey.

We are not perfect, but we are incredibly blessed."
