

## PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioners,

The Work of the People

*The Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time*

In the last installment, I talked about crosses, crucifixes, and candles. This week I want to spend some time writing about the tabernacle. In the past we may have thought of the tabernacle as the focal point of the church building because of its prominence on the altar and in the sanctuary. Since our worship at the time was more like adoration, the tabernacle seemed to be the focal point. When the altar was brought closer to the assembly and the people gathering around it became more a part of the worship, it was often thought that the tabernacle sat on an "altar" of its own. This is not true since there is to be only one altar in any church building. It is true that in large cathedrals and basilicas there are often many "side altars" but these buildings were designed and built for a time long in the past.

In order to understand the reason for a tabernacle, we have to understand something about the Eucharist. The church building, as I have already stated, exists for the primary purpose of providing a place for the People of God to gather for prayer and worship. It is here that we encounter our God in sacramental moments. One of those moments is encountering our God in the Eucharist and in our Eucharistic celebration. As I have been writing, the building, its configuration, and its contents ought to serve that Eucharistic celebration. As Roman Catholics we do, however, reserve the Eucharist after the celebrations.

Did you ever notice that the presider breaks a small piece of the host off and drops it into the chalice? This is a practice that came from the bishop of the church reserving part of the Eucharist that was consecrated on Sunday. Since the Eucharist was celebrated only on Sunday, people took part of what was left home and placed it in a distinctive place in the home. This may seem unusual (and maybe even sacrilegious) to us but remember that the Lord's Supper was celebrated in the homes of individuals early in our history.

The bishop also reserved some of the Eucharist to take to those who, because of illness, could not be present to celebrate with the community on that particular day. This was, and is today, the primary reason for the reservation of the Eucharist. Communion to the sick is called *viaticum*. The tabernacle therefore is a repository for the reserved sacrament so that it will be available for the sick. We have a tradition in Roman Catholicism of pastors taking communion to the sick on the First Friday of the month and now, because of Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist, the sick can receive communion every Sunday.

"The tabernacle, as a receptacle for the reservation of the eucharist, should be solid and unbreakable, dignified and properly ornamented. It may be placed in a wall niche, on a pillar, or eucharistic tower. It should not be

placed on an altar for the altar is a place for action not reservation. There should be only one tabernacle in a church building. A lamp should burn continuously near it" (*Environment and Art in Catholic Worship #80*).

I'll write more about the secondary reasons for Eucharistic reservation next week.
