### *The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time*

With the celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, this year on January 10, the Christmas Season comes to a close. We move into the winter portion of Ordinary Time which is just five weeks long this year. The time between the close of the Christmas Season and Ash Wednesday's introduction to Lent does not have to be fallow; it can be a time in which our faith can flourish and grow, "greening" in the spirit of this season's liturgical color. Perhaps one of the great opportunities of Ordinary Time – whether in winter or summer – is to make our discipleship visible not only through our words but also through our deeds.

On this Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, we hear from the first Book of Samuel. Four times Samuel utters the phrase "Here I am." He desires to respond to whomever calls him, whether Eli or God. Often, we think that Samuel does not respond to God's call until after Eli instructs him to say, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." Yet the reading opens with God calling to Samuel and Samuel's first utterance of "Here I am."

The second reading today is from the first Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians. In this section of the letter Paul deals with moral issues dividing the Corinthian community. His point is clear: avoid immorality. We are so united with Christ in our body that Paul instructs us that each person's body is the temple of the Holy Spirit.

We begin this Ordinary Time with a reading from the Gospel of John even though Mark's Gospel is the primary Gospel for this year. The choice of two of John the Baptist's disciples to follow Jesus after John identified Jesus as the Lamb of God corresponds to Samuel's call in the First Reading. Jesus invitation to the two disciples of John parallels God's invitation to Samuel. Samuel recognized it was God calling, so the disciples recognize Jesus as the Messiah.

The reflection for this Sunday is from Fr. Daniel Groody, CSC, who is associate professor of theology and director of the Global Leadership Program at the University of Notre Dame.

For the last few years, I have been teaching a course called "The Heart's Desire and Social Change." The class helps students discover where the deepest longings of their lives meet the needs and suffering of the world.

More often than not students can identify a global issue in the "outside world" that challenges

them. But they frequently struggle with the personal issues of the "inside world" that confound them. Without spending time in personal reflection before God, the heart can feel like a foreign territory. Unless we periodically disengage from the busyness of daily life, it is hard to listen to what is stirring within us.

When Jesus first sees John's disciples in today's Gospel, he asks them about their heart's desires: "What are you looking for?" In turn they also ask him a question, but it is not "what are we to do?" They ask first about where he dwells, where he lives in his innermost heart.

Discipleship begins with dwelling in Christ, entering the place of his loving embrace, staying under the gaze of his tender mercy. It involves living with a heart open to love, a heart willing to change, a heart ready to serve, a heart disposed to pray, like Samuel, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

The world is hungry not for busier people but bigger hearted people. They seek not only people who work for God but people who are so at home with God that they become a doorway into God.
