# The Work of the People The Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

We have had some real summer weather this year and I think that I am starting to wilt with the heat. It seems as though the leaves on the trees and plants are doing the same. Thank goodness we had some rain to help. I have even witnessed the leaves beginning to change into their autumn hues. Liturgically, we are moving into the later Sundays in Ordinary Time as well.

In the First Reading for this Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time Jeremiah again undergoes one of many sufferings as a result of his fidelity in proclaiming God's prophetic word to the people. His words of God's judgment and punishment for their sinfulness are continually rejected as the people take their anger out on Jeremiah personally, often endangering his life. Jeremiah, despite constant danger, trusted in the Lord and faithfully spoke God's words.

Addressing the opposition to their faith, values, and lifestyle, the author of the Letter to the Hebrews counsels the faith community to consider the sufferings and opposition that Jesus experienced during his lifetime and learn from it so "that you may not grow weary and lose heart." Jesus endured the Cross, despite its shame, and rightly took "his seat at the right hand of the throne of God." In similar manner, we too are to shed all sin and all that burdens us and persevere in the faith, running steadily towards the prize, total union with Jesus at God's right hand.

Luke's Jesus knows that his mission and ministry will bring opposition, rejection, and suffering. It will divide families, cause disruption and havoc in community groupings and bring division instead of peace. Aware of all this, Jesus longs to "set the earth on fire" with God's Kingdom, proclaiming a way of relating that is countercultural and contrary to the normal way of thinking and acting. As disciples we too are challenged to take up the same mission and ministry.

Jesus is and always will be the Prince of Peace. But the peace Jesus gives is not an absence of conflict.

Quite the contrary, as we hear today. The peace of God is like a sword that divides families,

and even churches. The division is caused by our refusal to embrace that costly commitment to discipleship. The strife comes because of our refusal, not because of God's vindictive wishes. Jesus knew what that human refusal did to the prophets who came before him, such as Jeremiah. Jesus knew that such human refusal of fullness of life would deal him a similar lot. And sometimes it seems that in 2,000 years of Christianity, our human refusal still condemns Jesus to death, without having to point fingers at those outside the Church.

"I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled!" Even though Jesus is wary of the baptism he is yet to undergo, which is his death, and even though he knows full well our capacity to refuse God's fire of love, he nevertheless continues to beckon us into this fire.

For the passion of God is a fire that does not destroy. The passion of God is a fire that brings life in overflowing measure. To let God's fire run through every vein of our being, we are to be committed totally. God's fire purifies, cleanses, and sets us ablaze. Jesus shows us what that blazing fire of love looks like.
