

## PASTOR'S LETTER

## The Work of the People

*Sixth Sunday of Easter*

This week we continue to look at the Liturgical Year and the celebrations within but from the perspective of color. Why are there a variety of colors and when do we use and display each one? Basically, there are four liturgical colors with some variations and exceptions. White is the color that can substitute for all others and therefore is the primary liturgical color and can be worn on any occasion. If a parish could afford only one set of vestments, it would be white.

White is worn for the Memorials of the Saints (except where that saint is a martyr) and is used for our great Feasts and Solemnities. White is worn during the Seasons of Christmas and Easter and on Solemnities such as Trinity Sunday and the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. Gold may be substituted for white and, if a parish owns a set of gold vestments, it would be used most appropriately at the celebrations of Christmas and Easter (especially at the Easter Vigil) since these are the most important celebrations of the year. White is worn also for celebrating most of the sacraments. White is always worn, for instance, at a wedding or baptism (except where the baptism is celebrated within a Mass during Ordinary Time). White is also worn for funerals and the celebration of the Memorial of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls). Since it is part of our tradition, though, violet or black may be worn on that day.

Red is worn for the Feasts and Memorials of martyrs and on Feasts and Solemnities of the Holy Spirit. Red is also worn during Holy Week when the Passion of Jesus is commemorated. In particular this is on Palm (Passion) Sunday and Good Friday. Red is worn on the Feasts of all the Apostles and the martyrs since it is the color of blood. It is also one of the colors of fire and so we associate it with the Holy Spirit.

Purple or violet is a color that refers to repentance and conversion. It is the color of the Season of Lent within which we are called to take on a more introspective and reflective attitude in our personal prayer and public celebrations. Traditionally, we have also worn violet for the Advent Season but this season has a very different character from Lent. Advent is a time for anticipation, waiting, preparation, and a time to experience the darkness of the world and our sin as we look toward the coming light. The color of Advent should be a purple that moves toward a deep blue (the darkness) whereas the purple of Lent will move toward red (the color of blood). The Episcopal Church has used a deep blue for Advent and, in some cases, we have adopted that practice as well. The blue is to be very deep however. One of the alternate colors that may be worn on the Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent is rose. In Advent this is

to symbolize coming closer to the light (Gaudete Sunday) and in Lent (Laetare Sunday) it is a kind of rest from the rigors of our penance.

Green is the color that is worn for most of the year. It is the color of hope and newness of life and reminds us of the presence and the promise of God's work in our lives. Green is worn throughout Ordinary (or ordinal) time. This is a time in which we count the Sundays from Second to Thirty-third. The First Sunday in Ordinary Time is the Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord and the Thirty-Fourth Sunday is the Solemnity of Christ the King. Green is also worn at weekday Masses for which there is no particular saint or occasion to celebrate.

We are a colorful church and these liturgical colors are also used in the environment of particular seasons and times of the year. Take notice of the colors and the changes.
