The Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

This past week brought a new phase in the pastoral service that I can provide at the State Correctional Institution here in Cambridge Springs. I haven't been able to celebrate mass with the inmates since March 15. Even when we began having Mass in person once again on June 1, there was a need to keep groups of inmates apart from one another so as not to spread the virus. I will begin Mass once again but for smaller groups of Catholics this Saturday, September 19. Please continue to pray for all the women at the prison.

For this Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time we turn once again to the Book of the Prophet Isaiah. These verses from Isaiah are proclaimed as part of the fifth Old Testament reading at the Easter Vigil. Seek the Lord is Isaiah's invitation. The prophet invites even the scoundrel and the wicked to turn to God because Isaiah knows in God is forgiveness so generous and so abundant that one will never turn back to one's old way of life. God's thoughts are so infinitely high, like the heavens, that we find our hope for mercy in God.

Paul established the first Christian community at Philippi and he now writes to them from prison. He understands the core of his faith to be life in Christ. Whether he lives or dies, he knows that he glorifies Christ in his body. His dilemma is that if he went on living, he would still serve the Philippians and continue the work of spreading the Gospel. If Paul were to die, he would be with Christ. In the midst of his own suffering, he exhorts the Philippians to behavior befitting those who proclaim the Gospel of Christ.

In this Sunday's Gospel, we move ahead from the conclusion in Matthew 18 and Jesus' teaching on forgiveness to the beginning of chapter 20, where Jesus tells his disciples the parable of the landowner and his workers. The landowner hires workers at varying times during the day, but pays them each the customary daily wage. Those laborers who worked more hours understandably exhibit frustration. The landowner's generosity turns the workers' worldview upside down. Such is the way it will be in the Kingdom of Heaven, where the last will be first in the first, last. This is God's new paradigm.

The Presbyterian preacher and writer M. Craig Barnes once wrote: "God is always present, but not always apparent."

I think part of our job is to change that—to help others see God's work in the world.

St. Paul touches on a similar idea today in his letter to the Philippians, declaring, "Christ will be magnified in my body." A magnifying glass enlarges what is small, making it clear. Paul wanted to bring that kind of clarity, the clarity of Christ, to others. And he exhorted his readers, the people of Philippi, to do likewise: "Conduct yourselves in a way worthy of the Gospel of Christ."

That is one tall order. And it challenges us to ask ourselves: Is it an order I can carry out?

Do I live in a way "worthy of the Gospel of Christ"?

Do others see reflected in my life and my choices the teachings of Christ?

Do I magnify the Lord? Do I enlarge him, proclaiming him in a way that is clear and unmistakable, with tenderness and mercy and generosity and hope? Or do I keep him inscrutable, illegible, small?

Part of our call is to serve as magnifying glasses for the Gospel.

We need to remember that God is always present—but strive to live in a way that also makes God apparent.
