The Work of the People The Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

As we move through this brief segment of Ordinary Time, we continue to hear the call of Christ to be good and faithful followers, those who recognize that we are sent, that we are apostles. In the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus continues to give us a clear message as to what being a faithful follower means. It is not an easy vocation to take up but it is necessary for the spreading of the Kingdom on earth.

The book of Sirach is a collection of wise sayings that help humans order their life and make right choices. These sayings have been handed on within the community. Sirach offers a series of choices, starting with the fundamental choice to keep the commandments of God. Three others follow: fire and water, life and death, good and evil. Each represents a total opposite of the other. The wise person chooses the positive option, the one that gives life. God allows a person to make such choices for God has given people the gift of free will.

The notion of wisdom connects the reading from Paul's first letter to the Church in Corinth with the reading from Sirach and the Psalm. Paul speaks of the wisdom of God which has been hidden from all time and which will be revealed in the time to come, the end time. This wisdom is not available to rulers of this age, or they would not have crucified "the Lord of glory." However, this wisdom has been made available through God's son and in turn to those who believe and accept him.

In Matthew's Gospel we continue Jesus sayings in the Sermon on the Mount. In this lengthy passage Jesus replies to those who have accused him of doing away with the tradition of the law and the prophets. He states that he intends to fulfill the law. His words are emphatic and he employs a repeating technique to make his point by using the phrase, "you have heard that it was said... But I say to you." Using four examples from Mosaic law Jesus offers an interpretation that goes beyond the mere letter of the law. He wants his listeners to live the law from their hearts, not from external obligation.

The reflection for this Sunday is from Paula Huston who is a Camaldolese Benedictine oblate and the author of two novels and seven works of spiritual nonfiction.

In a contest to find the scariest passage in the Bible, this one might win: "If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body thrown into Gehenna." What are we meant to do with such barbaric-sounding advice? Surely Jesus doesn't want us to take this literally?

He does not, despite a handful of scrupulous zealots throughout the centuries who have tragically removed body parts in order to keep themselves from sinning. What Jesus does mean is that we cannot allow ourselves to be spiritually derailed by worshiping at the feet of a golden calf. In my own case, the idol who stood its ground longest—who still rears its gleaming head and winks at me sometimes—was literary ambition. And though I tried hard to reconcile my unrelenting desire for the Pulitzer with my longing to be God's alone, compromise didn't work. It was only when I "tore it out and threw it away"—in other words, gave up writing altogether for a painfully long stretch—that I finally got my spiritual life on track. Recovering alcoholics cannot afford a single drink. Compulsive gamblers can't go back to the track, even just to admire the horses. And those of us who are enslaved to fantasy—even a noble-sounding, artistic fantasy, like winning the Pulitzer—cannot allow that fantasy to become our god.
