The Work of the People The Second Sunday of Lent

On this Second Sunday of Lent, we move further into the Lenten desert and continue our journey toward a more faithful discipleship. As people of faith who believe in Jesus' resurrection, we have confidence that Easter comes every year. We confess Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life. Still, each year Lent leads us to Holy Week. We entered Jerusalem again with Jesus on Palm Sunday. We hear his passion. We experience his obedience to Death on the Cross. Like his disciples, we often do not understand his Cross or the crosses in our own lives, yet we take this time in the liturgical year to reflect and to discern the ways God calls us to continue to testify to Jesus. How is God leading us back through the crucified and risen one this Lent and Holy Week? How will we as followers of Jesus point the way back to God for others?

The First Readings for the remaining Sundays of Lent are accounts of the blessings that God bestows on the chosen people. Today God directs Abram to leave his homeland and journey to a new land. God promises that great blessings will accompany Abram and his family. These blessings are many. Abram's offspring will be a great nation; and he will be a source of blessing for others for "all the communities of the earth shall find blessing in you." Abram's response was an act of unconditional faith.

The Second Readings for the Sundays of Lent include various instructions and exhortations for the early Christians. The central thread of these passages is the grace that has come from God through Jesus Christ. Paul reminds the "beloved" that their salvation has been won by Christ Jesus and not by any works that they have done. While it is good for us to engage in good works during Lent, indeed at any time, these works, however laudable, are not guarantors of our salvation. They are expressions of our gratitude for what God has done for us.

The account of the Transfiguration has all the marks of a biblical theophany, a self-revelation of God. The voice from the clouds, the fear of the bystanders and the mountain site are indications of a divine-human encounter. The voice from the cloud, understood to be God's, repeats the proclamation from Jesus' baptism. It is in sharp contrast to the mocking of the tempter in last Sunday's Gospel proclamation. But today Jesus' mission and identity are affirmed; he will continue to Jerusalem and to his Death and Resurrection. We will walk with him in these Lenten days.

The reflection for this Sunday is from *Lent: Reflection and* Stories by Megan McKenna who is an author, theologian, storyteller, and lecturer.

"This is my beloved son on whom my favor rests. Listen to him."

It's that simple: Listen to him and no one else in history. The disciples fall forward on their faces, flat on the ground, overcome with fear and awe, out of time, in the presence of the Holy. Then Jesus comes forward again into their lives and ordinary time and lays a hand on them saying: "Get up, do not be afraid." These few words are the essence of resurrection life: Arise and live without fear of death, the end of time, hate, injustice, suffering. We have been given the life of the Son of Man to sustain us in this history that serves God's time and promises.

When they look up again, they see only Jesus. That's the core, the heart of all history and of all life, only Jesus and what he brings into this world. On the way down the mountain Jesus commands them, in the same vein as Abram was commanded to leave his past behind, "Do not tell anyone of the vision until the Son of Man rises from the dead," that is, until the seemingly impossible becomes reality.

This account is an intimation of Easter five weeks from now. We are weak-hearted and basically timid and fearful folk and oftentimes, even by the second week of Lent, we're ready to give up. This Sunday is for courage, blessing, encouragement, and a moment of prayer, an experience of the glory of the Lord, of revelation for all us faint-hearted folk. It is for us when we act like Peter, wanting it easy, wanting to stay with glory, wanting to stay with our limited and oftentimes off-base assumptions about what is going on. It is a time for God to interrupt and once again tell us: "This is my beloved on whom my favor rests—the favor of grace, spirit, justice, care for the poor, obedience. Listen to him and not to anyone else."
