The Work of the People The Baptism of the Lord

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord celebrates one of the four great epiphanies of the Lord. The first is when the glory of God's presence in Jesus is made known to the Jewish shepherds; the second when that glory is revealed to the Gentiles in the figures of the Magi; the third is Jesus's baptism; the fourth is at the Wedding Feast at Cana. This Feast today also proclaims Sonship of Jesus by his anointing and appointment to his messianic office. It is the feast that proclaims the Baptism that elevates believers to the status of sons and daughters of God.

The First Reading today is from Second Isaiah and speaks of the profit proclaiming a word of comfort to God's people who are in captivity. The words of Isaiah speak of the time when God's people will be led back to their own homes; time at which the people of Jerusalem will proclaim once again "Here is your God."

We return to Luke's Gospel for this Feast. The baptism scene of Luke is structured in a similar way to the first Servant Song of Isaiah. The scene in Isaiah commences with the voice of God addressing an audience, so Luke's account begins with John addressing the people about the imminent advent of Christ in their midst and of his mission. John emphasizes the difference between his baptism and the one that the Messiah will administer. John's baptism is an acknowledgment of sin and repentance while Jesus's Baptism conveys the power of the Holy Spirit that will transform those who receive it in new birth in the Spirit. By the same token, one can only receive the cleansing fire and empowering gift of the Spirit when one acknowledges one's sinfulness. God's Word proclaims Jesus and his divine status and relationship to God.

I taught high school for over twenty years. During that time I carried a poster with me wherever I was missioned. It had three daisies on it and read: "I like being with you." I always hung it on the back wall of my classroom. Its message made me ask myself regularly: Am I, by my presence and actions in the classroom, telling my students that I like being with them—even if (on occasion) they did some unlikeable things?

That poster comes to mind when I read today's Scriptures in which God seems to be saying, "I like being with you." Through the prophet Isaiah, God speaks of "my servant . . . my chosen one in whom I am pleased." That servant could refer to Israel itself or even Isaiah. But the Christian tradition has identified him with Jesus.

Why does God like being with Israel, with Jesus? The answer is in the reading from Acts, where we are given Jesus' "job description": "He went about doing good." Why and how? "For God was with him." At Jesus' baptism the Holy Spirit descends like a dove, and a voice from heaven explicitly says, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." In other words, "I like being with you."

God likes being with us too, with you and me—even if we sometimes do unlikeable things. Isn't that what we celebrate at Christmas? God became incarnate in the person of Jesus to be with us and show us how to live.

By your presence and good actions today, convey to someone, "I like being with you."
