

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioners,

The Work of the People

The Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

When we speak of the environment of the worship space and the objects that symbolize and point to our beliefs as Christian and Catholic, it is necessary to consider things such as crosses or crucifixes, candles, the tabernacle, and statues. In considering these objects of art and worship, it is important to remember the role of art in our places of worship. They are to connect us with the unseen God who has become incarnate in creation. These objects must, therefore, connect us to the transcendent and the imminent, that which is beyond and that which, at the same time, is accessible to us humans. "What has happened in the last few centuries [preceding ours] is that Church art, architecture, and music have remained too aloof [*the transcendent side*], too alien to our mainstream of general culture. Most of the time they seem to be the products of secular imitation and not true religious creation. It is so easy for us to develop stereotypes and, in the name of tradition, to hand these down regardless of how sentimental they may be and deprived of true religious content" (*Art and the Church: The Need for Mainstreaming, Most Rev. Rembert G. Weakland, O.S.B.*).

With all of this in mind, I turn to the cross or crucifix. The difference between the two is that a crucifix is a cross with a *corpus* or an image of the crucified Christ attached to it. Generally, in Roman Catholic church buildings, we display a crucifix on the sanctuary wall behind the altar whereas most protestant church buildings have a cross. It may be interesting to note that at the Good Friday service most protestant denominations use a crucifix while we use a cross in our Roman Catholic observance.

The purpose of the crucifix is to remind us why we are gathered in this particular place in the first place. The mysteries of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection are at the center of our faith and worship. As we gather around the altar to celebrate "these sacred mysteries", we look to a symbol that tells that this act of our redemption is taking place today and always for us and for all people. "A cross [*crucifix*] is a basic symbol in any Christian liturgical celebration" (*Environment and Art in Catholic Worship, #88*).

One of the things to remember in the use of symbols is that we don't overuse. In this case, less is more. "A symbol claims human attention and consciousness with a power that seems to be adversely affected by overdose. For example, the multiplication of crosses in a liturgical space or as ornamentation on objects [*such as vestments*] may lessen rather than increase attention to that symbol" (*EACW, #86*). The same is also true for such things as the improper placement or excessive use of statues as objects of veneration in a space that is intended for public worship and not private devotion.

Candles usually accompany the crucifix in procession (especially at major celebrations) and are to be used judiciously. As fire is a symbol of the presence of God throughout Scripture, candles are a reminder to us of that presence, especially of Christ who is our light. The candles we use at each celebration are shadows of the great candle, the Paschal or Easter Candle that is a symbol of Christ. "The Easter Candle and its standard call for very special dimension and design. They occupy a central location in the assembly during the Easter season and a place at the baptismal font thereafter" (*EACW, #90*).
