The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

During this Ordinary Time, our parish liturgies call us to serve as Jesus served and to do God's will as disciples of Jesus, the Son of God and Son of Man, the Christ. His glory and light we proclaimed during Christmas Time. Now this glory and light beckons us on toward the Cross and the Kingdom of Heaven through a life of discipleship beyond the weeks in the interim after Christmas Time and before Lent. How will we, through hospitality, the proclamation of the Word, the celebration of the Eucharistic feast, and our song prayer help extend the call that Jesus' issues to follow him to those inquiring about a life of faith?

In the first reading for this Sunday Isaiah recalls Israel's history when the northern tribes were conquered by the Assyrians and placed in exile. Their situation is described as "darkness" and their living condition as being "in the land of gloom." Their eventual freedom is attributed to the intervention of God who came to them as a light. The result of this freedom was "great rejoicing" and "abundant joy." The prophet compares their jubilation to the joy that happens when the spoils of the harvest are shared, and when those in slavery are given their freedom.

On more than one occasion Paul takes the Church in Corinth to task for the divisions that arise among them. To-day's text is one example. Although Paul considers them brothers and sisters in Christ, he still takes responsibility for their spiritual welfare and for the harmony that should be among them. He dismisses their bickering over whom they should follow by reminding them that it is Christ Jesus who has saved them.

Today's Gospel reading is Matthew's account of the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. One of Matthew's themes is the connection between Jesus' mission and that foretold by the prophets. He does this by quoting the Isaian passage that was the first reading. Jesus is presented as the light for the nations. Now that John the Baptist has been arrested, Jesus takes up his ministry and calls the first four apostles. The immediate response of the four fishermen has become an example for every disciple who intends to follow Iesus.

The reflection for this Sunday is from *The Way of Repentance* by Irma Zaleski who was born in Poland in 1931. She has lived in Canada since 1952, where she has worked as a translator, university lecturer, and writer.

The call to repentance is fundamental to the whole Christian Tradition. It echoes throughout the Old Testament and lies at the very beginning of the New.... The early Fathers of the Church, the Councils, the saints, countless thousands of the faithful believed and tried to live out this call. How is it possible, then, that so many contemporary Christians—at least in the West—seem unable or unwilling to hear and answer it?

There are two main reasons for this, I think. First of all, perhaps, we no longer understand the real meaning of repentance. We do not often understand it in its true religious sense, as a way of love and freedom, of total trust in God's infinite mercy. Instead, we tend to view it in mainly psychological terms: as a negative emotion or state of mind, an expression of an exaggerated, even neurotic, sense of guilt.

Secondly, because we often do not understand the nature of salvation, we do not realize the immensity of what we

have lost as a result of sin. We cannot, therefore, mourn the absence of what we do not know we could have. In fact, we do not understand the true nature of sin. We tend to think of it as disobedience, the breaking of this or that commandment, individual wrong acts, rather than as a painful condition of the human spirit, a shadow background of all our lives. Thus we are inclined to view repentance as a way of paying a debt, a spiritual "transaction," and do not easily see it as a way of healing and life.
