The Work of the People

The Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

This week we move from the Preface into the Eucharistic Prayer proper. In the past when asked which part of the Mass was most important, we probably would have said "the consecration" meaning the Words of Institution and the Elevation. However, it is important to see the Eucharistic Prayer as a whole and to view it as one of the two focal points for our gathering. Again, those two points of focus are the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Remember that the Eucharistic Prayer is the central part of the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

The bishops of the United States have determined our prayer posture for this part of the Liturgy. After the Holy, Holy, we kneel throughout the Eucharistic Prayer. In almost every other country in the world, the bishops have decided that the prayer posture of standing provides a much better sign of the unity among all those who have gathered for the celebration. Some may think that kneeling is a posture that better expresses a reverence for what we are celebrating but that is just not the case. I remember when I was in Catholic grade school we were taught to stand when someone else came into the room (most especially for a priest, sister, or other teacher) as a sign of respect. Kneeling is more a posture of penitence or subservience. It is true that it can also be a sign of respect and reverence and this is the posture that has been chosen for us.

So, we kneel and the presider briefly prays an expression of God's greatness. The presider then, in the name of all those present, prays an epiclesis or an invocation addressed to God to allow the Spirit to "Make holy, therefore, these gifts, we pray, by sending down your Spirit upon them like the dewfall, so that they may become for us the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ." (EP II) Throughout this discussion of the Eucharistic Prayer, I will be quoting from Eucharistic Prayer II although the same elements may be seen in all the other Eucharistic Prayers with the exception of EP I. After asking for the presence and work of the Spirit, we move to the Words of Institution. These words are one of the few statements attributed to Christ that is present in all four Gospels. In knowing that, we come to know their importance to the early church and can, with a good deal of certainty, say that they are the exact words of Christ spoken at that last Passover Meal. These words express Christ giving himself to us but in the "Do this in memory of me", they also express that we are to give of ourselves to one another. They are words of invitation and words of gift giving: "Take this, all of you, and eat of it:" and "Take this, all of you, and drink from it:"

They are also words of self-sacrifice: "this is my Body which will be given up for you" and "this is the chalice of my Blood . . . (that) will be poured out for you and for many". In each instance, the presider takes the elements (the bread and the chalice) in his hands and after the Words of Institution, shows the consecrated host and the chalice to the people. In these actions and through these words Christ gives himself once again to us.

We are then invited by the presider to proclaim what is at the center of our faith, our life together in Christ and we respond with another of the sung acclamations. Form C expresses our faith thus: "Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free." We'll continue next week.
