# The Work of the People The Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

I hope by now that all of you who have the capability of using the St. Anthony of Padua Parish App have already downloaded it and established an account so that we will be better able to stay in contact with you. If you have not done so, there are instruction cards at each of the church entrances for downloading and installing My Parish App.

We move now to celebrate the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. In the first reading for the day, we hear Moses speak about God raising up a prophet from the Israelites' kin. The people want this, and God will fulfill their request. This gives the passage a messianic character. For Christians, the prophet God will raise up is Jesus. His words are the words everyone should heed. In a more general sense, we can interpret Moses' words at the conclusion of the passage as instructions on how to discern true and false prophets. We are to listen to a prophet who speaks God's words in God's name, but not one who speaks words other than those God has commanded.

In the reading from Paul's First Letter to the Church in Corinth we continue to hear about how the present age is passing away. Paul's words might lead us to wonder if Paul is preaching a preference for the unmarried life. The anxieties of the unmarried man and woman, he says, relate to the things of the Lord, while the anxieties of the married man and woman relate to the world. Paul, however, begins his instruction with the same wish for both those unmarried and married: to be free from anxieties.

Today's Gospel continues the reading from Mark that we began last Sunday. It marks the first appearance of Jesus teaching in a synagogue on the Sabbath. Mark does not tell us what Jesus taught; the Gospel writer only expresses the people's amazement at the authority with which Jesus teaches. The event in the synagogue concludes with Jesus curing a man possessed by a demon even after the demon cries out in words that ask why Jesus involves himself in the people's concerns. The demon refers to Jesus as The Holy One of God.

Do you ever harden your heart when you approach Jesus in prayer? I do.

Once, wanting to let go of a long-standing resentment, I confessed the sin at the Sacrament of Reconciliation and prayed for the person whenever I found myself remembering the litany of wrongs he had done. (And why was I reciting the litany, anyway, which only nestled the unclean spirit deeper into my heart?) The more I asked Jesus to remove the stubborn sin and its handmaidens (pride, self-pity, righteousness, envy), the more barriers I put in Jesus' way. If I sensed Jesus preparing to speak his word of healing I redoubled my grievance. As if he didn't know how I felt.

I know my unclean spirits, and they know me. Certain sins trail and tempt me, and if I am not vigilant they cling to my heart. They are the familiar contours that shape the false self I present to the world. I harden my heart because if Jesus expels the unclean spirits, I will be empty.

We are caught in a dance, Jesus and I; desire and defiance. He woos me, and I long to say yes, but then I cling to what I know. Jesus is more patient than I am. Maybe I will spend years in purgatory before I am cleansed. But I want my unclean spirits expelled long before I die, so that I can be free to do Jesus' work in the world, to fulfill my baptismal call, to sing joyfully to him, to offer true thanksgiving. If only I don't harden my heart.

January was Human Trafficking Prevention Month

Child Sex Trafficking is a form of child abuse that occurs when any child under age 18 is advertised, solicited, or exploited through a commercial sex act where sex is traded for money, food, shelter, drugs or anything of value. Traffickers can be anyone including friends, gangs, family members, foster parents, perceived trusted adults or boyfriends. Talk to your child openly about this reality and build resiliency. Address the myths and misconceptions that glamorize the commercial sex industry. Social media and gaming platforms are increasingly becoming the tool traffickers and other predators use to target, groom, and recruit victims. At some point your child will likely be confronted with inappropriate messages or see things online that they now are wrong. Teach your child how to handle these situations.
