The Work of the People The Presentation of the Lord

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is rooted in everyday life. In faithful observance of the Law of Moses, Mary and Joseph present Jesus in the Temple to consecrate him to the Lord. There they met the righteous Simeon and the prophet Anna, for whom Temple worship was part of everyday life. God rewarded the fidelity of Simeon and Anna by allowing them to see the one who was Savior and to hold him in their arms. When the ceremony of presentation was completed, Mary and Joseph and Jesus returned to their hometown. There, they created a home and a family life. There, Jesus grew up, becoming strong and wise, and the grace of God was upon him.

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, on February 2, is also called Candlemas Day. According to Luke's account of the Gospel, Simeon recognized Jesus as the Messiah in the Temple and declared him "a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel" (Luke 2:32). This sparked the traditional blessing of enough candles to last an entire year. This led to candle processions in churches and in the streets, which became known as "Candlemas."

In today's Gospel, we hear echoes of the other two readings: purification, sacrifice, the Lord coming to the Temple – light. Simeon, echoing themes first voiced in the Old Testament, proclaims Jesus as a light for the Gentiles and glory (another image of light) for Israel. There is also the note of purification and refining with reference to the child's destiny: "for the fall and rise of Israel" (Luke 2:34) and the revelation of the thoughts of human hearts.

The reflection today is by Sr. Gail Fitzpatrick, OCSO, who is a member of Our Lady of Mississippi Abbey in Dubuque, Iowa, where she served as abbess from 1982-2006.

"St. Luke's scene of the Presentation in the Temple is like a living mystery play. Joseph, Mary, Jesus, Simeon, and Anna – the 'main characters' – are changed forever by a moment of grace. This mystery play continues to unfold in our own lives.

Several years ago, our eighty-six-year-old senior sister lay close to death. All the community had gathered in her room to pray with her. When the time for Compline (Night Prayer) approached we prepared to go to church to pray the Office, leaving a few to watch with our dying sister. Then our youngest sister piped up: 'let's sing Compline here! Sr. Augustine loves Compline; she sang it with both sides.' (She would sit in the back of church and sing with both choirs!) So we began monastic night prayer, gathered around Sr. Augustine's bed. When we came to the Canticle of Simeon, her breathing gently slowed, and then stopped. She who had given no sign of being aware of our presence was very conscious – and her final act was to make her

own prayer the prayer of Simeon: Now, Lord, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation. Our sister had so imbibed Simeon's joy and sense of fulfillment that she could embrace the letting go of dying because she, too, knew salvation.

Simeon, Anna, and Sr. Augustine lived in hope. They believed, they waited, and when Jesus appeared, they recognize the moment of fulfillment – God's now – and became prophets.

We, too, are called to participate in this mystery play of life – to recognize Jesus in the most unassuming guises, let our life be changed forever by the encounter, and so become prophets in our own time."
