The Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

For this Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, in the Opening Prayer (Collect) we pray that we may “serve [God] with all our heart” and so “feel the working” of his mercy in our lives.

In today's First Reading, Isaiah describes the servant of God as one who is willing to undergo torment. The servant expresses nothing but gratitude and recognizes God as the one who opens his ears, who keeps him from disgrace and from not being proven wrong.

In the Second Reading James insists that genuine faith in Christ is more than intellectual. Real faith is demonstrated through Christ-like actions, such as caring for the needy.

In today's Gospel Jesus's retort to Peter's rebuke underlines the problem the disciples had to deal with. Peter had pulled Jesus aside to plead against the fate he predicted. When Jesus called Peter "Satan," the effect was not to say that he was a devil, but rather a tempter. The phrase "get behind me," pointed out that Jesus, not Peter, was the teacher. The place for a disciple was to follow the Master's lead, not vice versa.

The reflection for this Sunday is from *Silence, Solitude, Simplicity* by Jeremy Hall, OSB (1918-2008), who was a gifted retreat leader, and a member of St. Benedict's Monastery in St. Joseph, Minnesota.

As Christ asks us—asks you, asks me—who we say he is, we are surely on solid ground in responding with Peter and the creedal professions, “Messiah, Son of the living God.” But we are not asked the question at one definitive time (except maybe at our death) or only once. I am asked again and again, in times of joy and of pain, sometimes of anguish, as I experience life, grow up, grow old. We might well answer the Lord differently at different times.

What if Jesus stood before you now and asked you, as a profoundly personal question, “Who do you say that I am?”

Maybe insights and events in your life, enlightened by Scripture, have helped you to see Jesus as the Way: the way to the Father, the way to live now, trying to live by Jesus' commandment of love and the life of his Spirit within you and eternal life as the fruit of the way. Saint Thomas Aquinas, commenting on John 14:6, says that Jesus “is himself at once both the way and the goal. In his

human nature he is the way, and in his divine nature he is the goal. . . . Christ is the way by which we come to know truth, though he is also that truth.” And then he adds: “It is better to limp along the way than to stride along off the way.” I may limp along the true way and seem to advance but little, yet I move toward the goal. Tireless running on the wrong road only takes me ever farther from the goal, “Christ the Way”—the Christ who said, “I am the Way.” And to be on the way is itself a kind of arrival; to seek Jesus as the Way is already to have been found by him.
