

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Parishioners,

The Work of the People
The Seventh Sunday of Easter

I have gone through almost entire Liturgical Year with *The Work of the People* and I have gone through all of the important aspects of liturgy, at least in an introductory fashion. I want to spend the next few weeks tying up a few loose ends and discuss vestments, music and the liturgical environment. I suppose to call the last two of these three "loose ends" is doing these very important aspects of our worship a great disservice. Music enhances and supports our prayer and the environment gives us a sense of meaning within the celebration. For this week, let's briefly look at the vestments for liturgical celebrations.

Liturgical vestments vary little throughout the Catholic world although there certainly are variations in style. Clerical dress, however, is very diverse. Every once in a while, I get the comment from someone that he/she did not recognize me because I did not have my "priest clothes" on. I recently saw a picture of Pope Benedict XVI and Karl Rahner who were both teachers at the University of Tübingen at the time. The clerical dress of Germany was black suit, white shirt, and black tie. Clerical dress is worn so that one can be recognized as working or acting in some official capacity. Priests don't always dress in such a manner because we are not always acting in some ministry-related or "official" capacity. Believe it or not, we do have some time off.

Liturgical dress is another matter. The vestments (or clothes) may look a little strange by comparison to the dress of the historical era but this is mainly because the vestments do not come from this time but from another – basically from the Middle Ages. The vestments are part of our heritage though and they are symbolic. A priest may or may not wear an Amice which is a white, rectangular cloth with long ribbons attached at two corners. This is worn around the neck and was used to cover the cowl or hood worn by certain religious communities or, simply, to keep the vestments clean from perspiration. All priests and deacons wear an alb which is an inner garment – usually white from the Latin word *albus* – to cover his regular clothes or clerical dress as a sign that what he is about to enter into is something out of the ordinary.

A cincture – a cord similar to a belt – may be worn over the alb around the waist. The stole is then worn over the alb. Of all the vestments, the stole is the most important because it is a sign of liturgical and sacramental office. It demonstrates that the acts we are entering into are acts of God present in our lives and not simply something we are doing. The stole is the color of the liturgical celebration and it is worn around the neck with the two sides hanging down the front of the priest and over the left shoulder of the deacon.

The final garment is the chasuble and this too is the color of the liturgical celebration. This outer garment in one sense is meant to hide the human person of the presider – although not really – so that the person of the true sacramental presider – Jesus Christ – shows through. Remember one of the four manners in which Christ is truly present in the Eucharist is the person of the presider. The deacon's outer garment is called a dalmatic and has sleeves (unlike the chasuble) signifying the deacon's office of serving the liturgy. Vestments can be very simple or very elaborate but all give us a sense that what we do as the work of the people is something that profoundly affects our lives.
