The Work of the People Second Sunday of Easter (Sunday of Divine Mercy)

The Sunday of Divine Mercy is a day established by Pope John Paul II as "a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that humankind will experience in the years to come (May 23, 2000, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments). As the Octave day of Easter, the Lectionary readings and prayer texts highlight the mystery of divine compassion that underlies the Church's Easter faith.

As in years past, I present to you this week a summary of an Easter chapter of a favorite book of mine. This book is one among many written by Rev. Ronald Rolheiser, O.M.I. I recommend the book highly as words of wisdom for those interested in deepening their spiritual life. Rather than give you my own summary of the chapter in the book titled "A Spirituality of the Paschal Mystery", I pass along the words of a member of my *Jesus Caritas* fraternity, Fr. Monty Sayers.

In the chapter on the Paschal Mystery (named above), Fr. Rolheiser talks about paschal death and resurrected life. He writes, "Paschal death is a death that, while ending one kind of life, opens the person undergoing it to receive a deeper and richer form of life . . . resurrected life." (P. 146)

Rolheiser names and explains some of the ways we experience daily deaths:

The death of our youth
The death of our wholeness (health)
The death of our dreams
The death of our honeymoons
The death of a certain idea about God
and church.

In each situation, Rolheiser explains that we have moved from paschal death to resurrected living in five moments that he aligns with the paschal cycle of Jesus' death and resurrection:

Good Friday – name your death
Easter Sunday – claim your new birth
The Forty Days to the Ascension – grieve
your loss, your paschal death, and
adjust to your new reality
Ascension – do not cling to the old, but
let it ascend and bless you
Pentecost – accept the spirit of the new
life that you are in fact living.
What a wonderful way to celebrate Easter.

What a wise way to look at life. What a tremendous way of adjusting to the curve balls life hurls

In this time of pandemic, I encourage you to spend some time asking the Holy Spirit to reveal to you the paschal death to which you are being called to this year. Ask for the grace to grieve that loss. Are you adjusting well or do you need help to let go? Will you let it ascend? Will you allow the Son to bless you? Will you accept the new life God is offering you? Will you, with God's grace, Jesus' companionship and the Spirit's guidance allow dying and rising to be your way of living?

The secret of living life well is in living the Paschal Mystery.
