

The Work of the People

Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time

We live in times that might seem to some to be filled with signs of the end of time, but we are reminded on this Sunday that we know neither the day nor the hour of our own passing from this life to eternal or the Second Coming. These last few days have demonstrated that even the regularity of the seasons may not be so regular as we have experienced record-breaking high temperatures this past week. Whatever the case, God is certainly with us caring for us in this time of uncertainty and change.

This is the final Sunday before the Solemnity of Christ the King. One might wonder why the First Reading is the selection from Proverbs about a worthy wife. The woman's fear of the Lord is an example to us. Her works demonstrate how to respond faithfully to the God's call. Her reward for life well lived is entrance into the heavenly Jerusalem.

The Second Reading begins with Paul affirming that he really does not need to write the Thessalonians about anything related to the times and seasons, especially the time when Christ will come again. As a people of faith, they know, Paul says, that Christ will come like a thief in the middle of the night. The timing of Christ's coming will be unexpected. The Thessalonians are children of the light, not of the dark, so the unexpected nature of Christ's coming will not leave them behind. Children of the light stay awake for the coming of Christ.

The well-known parable of the talents is the Gospel on this final Sunday in Ordinary Time before Christ the King Sunday. This parable is about the kingdom of heaven, and who is in and who is out. One could incorrectly get the sense from this parable that what we do with the gifts God gives us determines our entry into the kingdom of heaven. Yet, the parable is not about us earning our salvation, but rather about how responsible we are with all our generous God gives us, including salvation. God calls us to imitate his generosity to the best of our ability, for in doing so we accept God's invitation to share the Master's joy.

The reflection for this Sunday is from Kimberly Hope Belcher who is a married mother of three children and a professor of theology and liturgy at the University of Notre Dame.

At the end of the year, the Church also looks to the harvest of time: the final fulfillment of the work that Jesus began in his life, death, and resurrection. Although he does not need us to complete his work, the Lord has chosen to entrust his heart to us as his human family. As his worthy spouse, we work with God for the healing of the world. We are now God's betrothed, who, like the king's wife in Proverbs, do our work with loving hands, moved by thankful fear of the Lord.

The third servant in today's parable understands something about the master of the universe that we may forget: God is not ashamed to harvest where another has planted and to gather what someone else has scattered. God has the audacity to take even the evil planted by the enemy and turn it into a rich harvest of good—to see in misshapen fruit, rich food for the hungry, or in this year's rotting vegetables, next year's compost. God sees our future in the wounds of our past.

In place of the servant's fear of wrath, we should pray for the fear of the Lord, which is the gift of hope. Looking to the harvest with hope instead of fear, we become children of the day. Instead of counting up blemishes, we reach out our hands to the poor and extend our arms to the needy. In this way, the chosen people will become a fitting bride for Christ, the King of Creation.
