The Work of the People The Third Sunday of Advent

Last Sunday, the Second Sunday of Advent, we were introduced to John the Baptist and to his prophetic message: The Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." This Sunday we hear of what others, especially Jesus, though of John and his message.

Today is also called *Gaudete* (Rejoice) Sunday. The Third Sunday of Advent (like the Fourth Sunday of Lent) is a day of joy in the midst of a season of penitential preparation. The Entrance Antiphon (Rejoice in the Lord always) captures the mood of the entire liturgy as we move into the second part of Advent. There is a sense of joyful expectation, and an awareness that the fulfillment of God's great plan for us is near.

The reading from the prophet Isaiah speaks once again of the restoration of the Davidic kingdom. There is much joy and anticipation as we await rare desert flowers and miraculous cures. God restores all that has become barren to former beauty, and those who have been taken captive in Babylon will be freed and will enter Zion (Jerusalem) singing. What encouragement for the feeble and the frightened, to hear that they will be made whole once again.

In the Letter of St. James we hear that patience is a difficult virtue to learn and act upon. None of us wants to hear "in God's time." We want what we want now. Yet, in his wisdom, James counsels that we must wait patiently and joyously, and never give up. Temptation and rash judgments are things which can get us into trouble when we do not think things through and spontaneously act upon our desires.

Unlike the message in the Letter of James, John the Baptist becomes impatient, wondering "are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" He seems disappointed that there is not a big, fiery finish. Jesus rebukes him and, paraphrasing Isaiah, says that the prophecies have now been fulfilled.

This Sunday's reflection is from *Mixed Blessings* by Barbara Brown Taylor who is a best-selling author, professor, and Episcopal priest.

"And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me," [Jesus] concludes, in one of the most ignored passages of all time. The Greek word for offense is *skandalon*, which makes the literal translation something more like, "And blessed is anyone who is not scandalized by me." But to the ancient Greeks the word meant a stumbling block,

so that the best translation is, "And blessed is anyone who does not get tripped up on me." What is Jesus saying? That the Messiah has not come to be the center of attention? That he has not come to ascend a throne, to fulfill all the expectations of his people? It sounds that way. It sounds as if he has come not to wield power but to give it away, to be himself, to glorify God, and finally to disappear into the crowd of those who have found his love contagious.

What is Jesus saying? It sounds as if he is saying, "Go tell John that everyone who is expected has already arrived. Go tell him what you hear and see. Things may not be working out the way he wanted them to, but every now and then, in surprising places, marvelous things are happening. People who were blind to the love loose in the world have received their sight; people who were paralyzed with fear are limber with hope; people who were deaf from want of good news are singing hymns. And best and most miraculous of all, tell John that this is not the work of one lonely Messiah but the work of God, carried out by all who believe, and there is no end in sight. Tell him I am the one, if you must, but tell him also that yes, he should look for another, and another, and another. Tell him to search every face for the face of God and not get tripped up on me, because what is happening here is bigger than any of us. What is coming to pass is as big as the Kingdom of God."
