The Work of the People The First Sunday of Advent

"O Come, O Come, Emmanuel!" Our sanctuaries and homes ring with these ancient words of the *O, Antiphons*, an invitation and welcome as we embrace the season of Advent. Quieting ourselves, much as the coming of winter stills and quiets the natural world, we seek to prepare a place for Christ to come again and to be born a new – for his coming or "advent" – into our hearts and into our world.

During the Season of Advent, we often hear from the prophets who proclaimed the coming of the Messiah. In today's reading, Isaiah's prayer of lamentation is the cry of the people who believe that God has abandoned them in their distress. The tone of the lament appears to blame God who has allowed them to wander from the ways of God. But God's anger may be justified because the people have been sinful. The passage, however, ends with the statement of hope: "O Lord, you are our father; we are the work of your hands."

At the beginning of his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul greets the people with the typical salutation of grace and peace. He gives thanks to God for the many gifts bestowed on them, reminding them that their good fortune is rooted in the grace of God. The end of the passage has an advent tone; he reminds them that it is God who will keep them faithful until "the end."

As we begin this new liturgical year and move into Cycle B of the Readings, we hear God's Word from Mark's Gospel. The account we hear today sets the tone for our Advent spirituality: "Be watchful! Be alert!" A brief parable about the master and his servants underlines the urgency of Jesus' message. Just as the servants are to take care of the master's possessions until his return, so too are Jesus' disciples to take care of the gifts entrusted to them by God. Neither the servant nor the disciple knows when the master will return.

Advent is my favorite liturgical season, as its readings encompass so much of both the Old and New Testaments. In order to prepare to celebrate the birth of the infant Jesus, we revisit the whole of salvation history. With Isaiah as our guide, we can't go wrong. We journey forth on a highway where even fools can't go astray.

But Advent is also a challenge, as it requires us to begin again. We go to great lengths to attain status as experts, and not beginners. We regard repetition, going back to stories we've heard a thousand times over, as a waste of our precious time. The familiarity of the readings of Advent and Christmas can deaden our hearts.

Maybe that's why today's readings insist that we wake up from our self-absorbed stupor. The Collect asks us to "run forth" towards Christ; Isaiah asks God to return to us with awesome deeds. The psalmist prays to God: "rouse your power, and come to save us." St. Paul reminds us that our job is to wait, not only for the incarnation of Jesus but for his second coming. And in the Gospel Jesus says: "Be watchful! Be alert!"

Advent reminds us that God's ways are not our own. It asks us to take a realistic look at who we are, people in need of God's grace, beginners who must start all over again in this season to be reminded of the good news that is our salvation in Jesus Christ.
