The Work of the People The Second Sunday of Advent

Each year at the Second Sunday of Advent the focus of the Scriptures moves from the second coming of Christ to our preparation for celebrating the first coming of Christ into the world. The message Christian disciples hear this Advent is first and foremost a message about who God is and all God does for God's people. The Scriptures tell us God saves, God shelters and protects us, God's light triumphs, God provides nourishment, God comforts and heals, God's justice reigns. Through Advent we learned that in Jesus is the revelation of God. As disciples, we confess Jesus as Lord, the Son of God, the Son of Man.

In the reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, the Root of Jesse is described in an allegorical sense. Here, a little shoot comes out of a barren stump and will reach out to the Gentiles. The wolf and the lamb, the child in the adder (a snake), are examples of this extreme contrast between what was possible and what will be.

As Paul writes to the Church in Rome, we find that endurance and encouragement are curious descriptions of God. It contrasts with the sometimes angry and brooding images of God we hear in the Old Testament. Paul called for harmony among the early Church followers. This is not that much different than the Christian communities and various theologies of God that exist today. Jesus led us to look beyond our differences and ministered to people in many walks of life.

The Gospel introduces us to John the Baptist who preached a difficult message, and challenged the Pharisees and Sadducees, "Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath?" One is not baptized out of fear, nor is it about pedigree, education, background, or position. Baptism is a response to the call to "produce good fruit as evidence of... repentance."

There shall be no harm nor ruin on all my holy mountain. Not there is, but there shall be. Oh, couldn't you cry? Shall. Will. On that day. Future tense. Justice shall flower in his days. Shall... Which means—what? That we are still burdened with the present inadequacies and even the present idiocies of the human condition, its pain and dislocation. That we have still to walk on roads

pot-holed with wars and after-wars; that we have to live with the memories we wish were not.

But, listen. Our impressions of time are unreliable: Then. Now. Not yet. But we are misled. We think then: God has entered and captured the human condition. He has accomplished his Great Work. Now: we are caught in the tangles and shards of what we have made of that adventure. Not yet: Tomorrow. Someday.

But what if . . . What if not yet is already here, dark and smudged and incomprehensible. But here. What if not yet is already now. What if Advent is a hand reaching through a bank of fog, holding together, all at once, what we think of as then and not yet.

In the Now. What if the glory that is to come is already here, and the fullness of the Adventure is resting in our hearts no matter how dim and confused and unsatisfactory that rest is feeling. Hold out your heart. The unfelt certainty of now rests lightly there. What has been and is and will be: the now that is forever.
