The Work of the People
Fourth Sunday of Easter (Good Shepherd Sunday)

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is traditionally referred to as Good Shepherd Sunday. Hearing the Shepherd's voice, followers recognize and know it is their God. Safe in the knowledge that they cannot be taken from the hand of the Shepherd, those who hear his voice follow as faithful believers willing to go where God calls and sends them.

In today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles, Peter's good deed of healing a man who was crippled from birth is under examination by the Sanhedrin. Would that our testimony to the person and power of Jesus Christ be as forthright as his. Peter identifies Jesus as the cornerstone through whom salvation comes.

The reading from the First Letter of John expresses how much love God has for us. We are God's children – not later, but now! Our future, God is yet to reveal. But we have confidence that because of the gift of God's Son, who became like us in all ways but sin, we too, will be like God.

In today's Gospel, we hear that Jesus knows those who follow him. He would do anything, including laying down his life for his sheep. We know he did suffer and lay down his life. We also know he rose to be the one shepherd of the one flock. Jesus' leadership contrasts starkly with that of a hired man who shepherds sheep he does not know and love. Today's Gospel reminds us of how blessed we are to have Jesus as our Good Shepherd guiding us through our lives.

The reflection for this Sunday is from *Living Love* by Sr. Ruth Burrows who is a Carmelite nun at Quidenham Monastery in Norfolk, England.

Jesus is saying that the Father is seized with love, admiration, gratitude to him because he lays down his life fully. Why should the Father be so enamoured of this act of Jesus laying down his life, accepting to die?

In the first place because the Father can only find an outlet for his love when a human creature consents to die to his own limited, merely natural life.

The condition for being transformed into God's likeness, for entering into his own dimension is—being ready to go beyond ourselves, allowing ourselves to be taken away from self, consenting to leave the limitations of our merely natural being.

This acceptance of dying has to be done in the dark, in blind trust in the promise of the Father.

The dimension into which we are called is "God": so "other," so mysterious as to be beyond thought or imagination; and therefore, in a sense, meaningless to us.

We live a caterpillar existence and are completely incapable of conceiving of a butterfly existence. It is an awful thing to be told—or rather asked—to be willing to die to our caterpillarness in order to be something we have no notion of and no desire for.

We like being caterpillars—we have cabbage leaves to feed on, our world is circumscribed and manageable, it's solid. "What's all this about a new way of being . . . ? Flitting about in the air . . . ? No thanks—I'd rather be as I am!"

God's agonizing struggle is to get his human creatures to love and trust him enough to make the decision, to accept to die to their caterpillar life . . .

But Jesus accepted. This is the great triumph. He accepted, with all the adoring love of his heart, to lay down his life. This act was his supreme expression of the greatness of his love for his Father—that he, the Father, mattered alone, and that all Jesus wanted was to do his will, and to allow the Father to do in him and through him whatever he pleased.

And it is then God's good pleasure to fill his creature with blessings.
