The Work of the People The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

I thought it might be good to break from my usual column on the scriptures for this Sunday to looking a bit at this time in our Liturgical Year. Besides the times of the year that have their own distinctive character, there remain in the yearly cycle thirty-three or thirty-four weeks in which no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ is celebrated, but rather the mystery of Christ itself is honored in its fullness, especially on Sundays. This period is known as Ordinary Time. It seems as though those who put the Lectionary of Sunday Readings together decided that this would be a time in and through which we follow Christ in his mission and ministry on earth and through the example that Christ gives us come to a better understanding of our call from God and response to that call. We come to see more clearly how we are called to participate in the mission and ministry of Christ through Baptism.

After the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, Ordinary Time begins. In these Sundays, we all witness the beginning of Jesus's ministry. We will hear the call to discipleship and the paradoxes and difficulties, the clarity and misunderstandings that will be encountered in the proclamation of the reign of God. There is a continuity between Christmas Time and these Sundays of Ordinary Time. In fact, this time used to be called the Sundays after Epiphany to make that continuity a little more apparent. That continuity is the call for a time of recommitment to our own baptismal mission. (Have you ever taken time to think about what your baptismal mission may be and how you are responding to it?)

After the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we return to ordinary days, to the ordinary rhythms of life. It is a time to get back to our places of education and business, a time to pack away the lights and trees and decorations and experience for a time a kind of plainness or emptiness. But our lives are not empty since we are living Emmanuel, God with us. The gifts that gave such joy and delight when they were received become a part of daily life, speaking to us of the giver's love whenever we see or use them. We might most appropriately then ask ourselves: "What about the greatest gift of all – the Son of God, whose Incarnation we have just celebrated?"

Ordinary Time could be called the "season of Sundays." Interspersed with a certain number of Holydays of Obligation, it allows us to celebrate fully the special character or our original feast day, Sunday, called the Lord's Day, the first day, the eighth day, and the day beyond our cycle of time.

Ordinary means "numbered" not "commonplace." It is based on the use of our ordinal numbers that count days and time as first, second, third, etc. However, we do tend to think of Ordinary Time as the

"nothing in particular" time of the year. But since the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, time itself is anything buy ordinary. Not only on Easter, but every Sunday of the year, the Church relives the Paschal Mystery. Ordinary Time, because it celebrates no particular mystery of Christ, gives an opportunity to enter more deeply into the mystery of Sunday.

This is a time, too, to reevaluate how I have been honoring the Lord's Day and responding to God's presence and action in my life by gathering with the worshipping community to give thanks to God. If my relationship with God is at all important to me, this is the primary way through which I can express that. In this Ordinary Time, let us continue to give thanks to God by our full, conscious, and active participation in the great prayer of thanksgiving, Sunday Eucharist.
