The Work of the People The Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

I had a very refreshing, if not completely relaxing, time as Catholic Chaplain for the week at The Chautauqua Institution during the week of July 3 – 10. It is always good to get away but there is always much work waiting for the "catching up" time. This past week the Cambridge Springs Ministerium held Vacation Bible School for 2021 and we were once again able to learn about the good things of God in person. The Ministerium is sponsoring a Community Worship Morning on Sunday, July 25 at the Firefighter's Carnival Grounds. Rev. Johnny Bridges will deliver the message at that service. Certainly, all are welcome.

This Sunday we hear from the prophet Jeremiah. Jeremiah's prophetic words in the first Oracle are a warning to those who mislead God's people. The shepherds who did not care for their people, God will punish. No longer will they have their jobs, for God will replace them with shepherds who will attend to their flocks. In the second part of the reading, Jeremiah communicates God's promise that God will raise up a "righteous shoot" to David. The king will save both Israel and Judah through his reign of justice.

Paul writes that Christ Jesus abolishes the wall that once divided Jews and Gentiles. They are now one Body in Christ existing in peace. All the legalities and detailed commands of the Mosaic law are no longer necessary. What is necessary is that we strive as a people to live the unity of the one Church in reality.

Last Sunday, Jesus sent the Twelve out to proclaim repentance, to exorcise demons, and to heal the sick. In this Sunday's Gospel, the Twelve return and provide Jesus with a summary report. True to his form as an evangelist of few words, Mark does not describe to us what the Twelve reported. Their mission, however, must have exhausted them because Jesus invites them to come away and rest by themselves.

The reflection for this Sunday is from Fr. Daniel P. Horan, OFM, who is the author of several books, including *All God's Creatures: A Theology of Creation*.

The prophet Jeremiah reminds us that one of God's key attributes is justice. So central is this aspect of our understanding of divine action and intention that "justice" is a fitting divine name. God wants leaders to model themselves in the Ex. 14:5-18/Mt

pattern of divine justice. And God promises to raise up such leaders.

Jesus regularly draws on this prophetic imagery, famously referring to himself as the Good Shepherd while calling out unjust and merciless religious leaders in his time for being bad or unjust shepherds. Though a lot of attention is given to shepherds, I wonder what is expected of the sheep and what responsibility is expected of us who profess to follow the Good Shepherd. In other words, let's talk about sheep.

Too often we dismiss ourselves as "just sheep," as unimportant followers of the more important shepherd. But rather than considering ourselves as merely dispensable lemmings, that is, "just sheep," maybe we need to think of our vocation to be just sheep—those called to exemplify the justice demonstrated by our one, true Shepherd. To overlook our call as followers of Christ is to act as "sheep without a shepherd." But having been baptized into the life, death, and resurrection of Christ, we can walk confidently into the future, embracing our identity as images of the God of justice.

In this way, we demonstrate that not only does God promise to raise up leaders, but God also promises to raise up just sheep.
