THE URGENCY IN CHRIST'S MISSION

REFLECTION:

Urgency is of the utmost importance in today's message, and Jonah sets the standard. He unhappily arrives in Nineveh lacking enthusiasm for his task of preaching to Israel's antagonists and telling them that Yahweh is not enamored with their lifestyle. Yahweh wants them to repent, and Jonah has to convince them to do it.

However, despite Jonah's lack of passion, the citizens consented to amend their lives almost before Jonah finished his first sermon. The incredulous speed of their change of heart truly demonstrates the power of God's free gift of grace.

Again, urgency is the bottom line of Paul's message. Since Christ may be coming again soon, the Corinthians are urged to set aside earthly matters and make Christ's return a priority. Mark rounds out this sense of urgency with Jesus calling all to conversion by believing in the death, resurrection and exaltation of Christ, and using their help in establishing God's kingdom.

Even the swiftness of the apostles' acceptance to Christ's invitation is high-

lighted in Mark's Gospel. Zebedee is left in his boat as his sons leave with Christ. Again, all of these actions are attributed to the power of God's grace.

The lesson for all disciples — right up to today — is to respond to Christ's coming with a sense of urgency. Time waits for

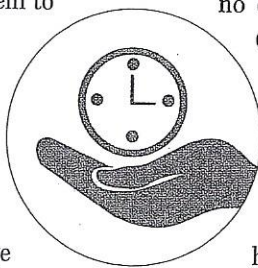
no one, including the building of God's kingdom. Every life may seem full of years, but the years pass quickly. Procrastination must be overcome.

Remember the story of the hare and the tortoise. The hare was miles ahead of the

tortoise, almost at the finish line,

but he was tired from all that running. He decided to stop and rest because he had a large lead on that sluggish tortoise. While he was napping, the tortoise passed the sleeping hare and crossed the finish line well before the hare awoke. In the end, the hare's procrastination cost him the race.

This week's readings remind all disciples that Christ's message is not something to do "someday" or even "later." Like the slow but steadfast tortoise, Christ's message demands a dedicated response to begin now — in this present moment.

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." With these words, Jesus invites Simon (Peter) and his brother Andrew to follow Him and be His disciples. We often speak of the subtleties of translation. In the original Greek in which St. Mark wrote his Gospel, a better translation would be, "Come after me, and I will make you become fishers of men." It is the beginning of a process. We are called to that same process. It is not as if it happens quite suddenly. It happens over time, and it is a progression. If we are to be "fishers of men," we are to be evangelizers and disciples of the Lord, and we are to represent what it means to be part of the Kingdom of God. Of course, Simon and Andrew "abandoned their nets and followed him." It may be more difficult for us to "abandon our nets" so to speak, but it does prompt us that we need to make major changes in our lives if we are going to follow Jesus. Simon and Andrew, and then James and John, were common men, normal people. They had no theological credentials nor did they have any special status in the world. Most of us are similar. Jesus did not select them (or us) for who they were. He called them for what He could do through them. It is the same with each of us. Yes, we are called, but in order to really fulfill our calling we need to follow and trust in Jesus.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In his 2017 World Communications Day Message, Pope Francis takes an unblinking look at how information is impacting our culture. While acknowledging that a constant focus on bad news contributes to anxiety and fear, he knows we cannot ignore the challenges of our times. Yet he still finds room for hope. "I would like to contribute to the search for an open and creative style of communication that never seeks to glamorize evil, but instead to concentrate on solutions and to inspire a positive and responsible approach on the part of its recipients," he writes. "I ask everyone to offer the people of our time storylines that are at heart 'good news.'" That is exactly what we try to do in the Diocese of Erie. Overseeing our efforts to evangelize, to teach, to empower and to minister to those in need – not to mention the logistics of interacting with 97 parishes, 43 schools and dozens of ministries and agencies spread out across 10,000 square miles – requires that we share an enormous amount of information. We prioritize inspiration as well. As Faith magazine begins its 13th year of publication, it's clear there will never be any shortage of stories about people in our diocese who are living out the Gospel with creativity and generosity. This year, we also are preparing to launch an updated website, designed to be welcoming, engaging and user friendly. And I have been enjoying reaching out to you with my new Twitter account in recent months. Each of these efforts is important to our lifelong journey as disciples. 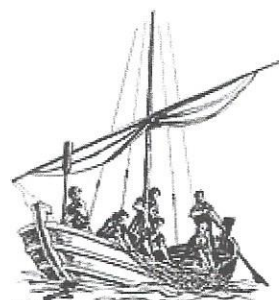

MEMORIAL OF MARIANNE COPE, VIRGIN

Follow an inspiring example

Many of us have heard of Father Damien, famous for his work with those with leprosy, but Sister Marianne Cope, at the age of 45 likewise volunteered for the Hawaiian mission at Molokai. She served girls and women with leprosy, emphasizing "pride and fun" and dignity in the colony. Soon after her death, a local woman wrote in the *Honolulu Advertiser* that she was "a woman [who devoted] every hour of 30 years to the mothering of people isolated by law from the rest of the world. She risked her own life in all that time, faced everything with unflinching courage, and smiled sweetly through it all." Who can you help today, right at home, to see beyond the harshness of life?

MEMORIAL OF FRANCIS DE SALES, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

Be the retiring type

Saint Francis de Sales (1567-1622) led a full life, both before and after his relatively late decision to join the priesthood. In his era, a life of holiness was considered the domain of monks and nuns, certainly not of laypeople. But he believed God could and should be found in everyday life and was one of the first great religious teachers to offer spiritual direction to lay Catholics living and working in the world, such as in his book *Introduction to the Devout Life*. His advice to those busy with the world's affairs is as valid today as it was then: "Retire at various times into the solitude of your own heart, even while outwardly engaged in

discussions or transactions with others, and talk to God." Practice a little "early retirement" today!

The amazing thing about Saint Paul's conversion was that he went from persecutor of Christians to a devout Christian himself. The change in him was so incredible not everyone believed it at first. How could this person who was out to imprison and kill Christians suddenly be one of them? For God all things are possible. With God's help, that makes a lot of things possible for us, too.

Timothy and Titus were companions and coworkers of the apostle Paul. We call them bishops because Christian tradition sees them as the first leaders of the churches in Ephesus (Greece) and Crete. They carried the gospel to the world in the earliest days of the church. They show us that the best way for our faith to live and grow is to live it. All Christians, not only leaders, bear a responsibility to take part in the mission of the church. To spread the faith, make yourself a living example of it.

MEMORIAL OF ANGELA MERICI, VIRGIN, RELIGIOUS FOUNDER

Share and share alike

Saint Angela Merici didn't set out to form a typical religious community of women. An orphan herself, she began by simply giving religious instruction to the poor and uneducated children of her neighbors. Before long, other women were attracted to join her. By the time she was 50, prompted by a heavenly vision, she began a community of women called the Ursulines who embraced virginity, poverty, and obedience. But they took no formal vows. They didn't formally congregate as a religious community, either, but stayed at home to evangelize to their family, friends, and neighbors. Evangelism can begin with even the tiniest seed. With whom will you share a bit of the Good News today?

TODAY'S READINGS: 2 Samuel 12:1-7a, 10-17; Mark 4:35-41 (322). *"Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?"*
