At the meeting we will begin discussing demographics and trends, as well as a proposed plan for parishes in Erie County. It is well known that we already have too many parishes and parish buildings in Erie County and not enough priests for them and given the current life of the Church there will be changes. What these changes will be and when they occur will become clearer as we continue to meet. The primary goal of pastoral planning remains creating healthy, vibrant parishes where people can grow in their relationship with Christ. Please pray for everyone involved in this process to make prudent and wise decisions. While the future appears uncertain, we can trust that Jesus and his Church will always be here for us.

Lent is a good time to consider **how we treat the people in our lives**. All of us at one time or another are quick to criticize each other and I share these words from the **Venerable Francis Xavier Nguyên Văn Thuân** as inspiration: "Criticism is easy; it is within everyone's reach. A pessimistic nature easily finds the defects and shortcomings in others. But everyone, without exception, has defects. Even the saints needed a lifetime to become Christlike, to become perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect. Keeping an account of people's faults is a fruitless task. Not only are you showing your pride and ill will, but you are also wasting your time. To remember a person's defects is to hold onto the past and to concentrate on that person's worst side, as if no other existed! No one's life is frozen; everyone is constantly evolving, changing, growing. You must concentrate your entire attention on the present and the future rather than the past. One who has sinned but who bears his or her past with sorrow may be a saint today or become one tomorrow. Such a person may make swifter progress on the road toward holiness than me. While I waste my time and strength criticizing and complaining about others, those who seemed to me to be further behind on the road are setting out and moving forward quickly and soon will have gone beyond me." Cardinal Nguyên Văn Thuân († 2002) was imprisoned by the Vietnamese government for thirteen years, during which time he secretly sent prayers and spiritual writings to his flock.

Living Water

In our Gospel Jesus encounters the woman at the well and this is far from an ordinary meeting: It is with a Samaritan with a mixed marital history, spurned by others such that she must come to the well at the hottest time of day, when no one else is there. The Samaritan woman, for instance, could not have been expecting some new spiritual awakening when she went to perform the simple task of drawing water. Yet her daily chore of drawing water, as necessary for her life as for the Israelites in the desert, led to her encounter with Jesus, who offers her "living water." The Samaritan woman knew there was something different about Jesus as soon as she came to the well. When he looked at her, she saw in his glance that he knew her completely – he knew exactly what kind of person she was. When Jesus spoke to her it was the beginning of a conversation that changed her life. She came to the realization that not only did he know her through and through but that he cared for her. This encounter forever changed her heart – where once she had a wall protecting her heart, she was now free. Her daily chore of drawing water, as necessary for her life in the desert, led to her encounter with Jesus, who offers her "living water." Like the woman at the well, we, too, are seeking the living water of God's mercy. All of us thirsting for something that fulfills us – whether it is a career, a human relationship, or possessions. Not only does Jesus know everything about us and he comes to meet each one of us right where we are in life. He cares for each one of us where we are - right here, right now. Lent invites us to be more purposeful in our efforts to develop our relationship with Jesus. as it reminds us that God is also seeking us. He is taking the initiative to engage us so that we might experience this flowing water, and so live in ways that are worthy of him. Today, let us seek the living water by telling Jesus about our needs, our concerns, wants, and our sorrows. The mere start of this conversation may just change our lives.
