Jerry Priscaro inside the church at the same time for those who are unable to march. Following the rosary, there will be a special prayer service inside the church with exposition and Benediction. Father David Renne, vice rector of St. Mark Seminary, Erie, and a member of the faculty of Gannon University, Erie, will be the guest homilist. Today's **second collection** is the annual Catholic Education Collection to raise funds for faith formation programs throughout the entire diocese.

Special thanks to **Bob Mazur** for getting the parish LED sign in front of St. Ann's working. The sign was inoperative for several years and Bob put in many hours problem solving.

We have a buyer with a strong interest in purchasing the Holy Family property. Our councils met on Thursday and approved moving forward with talks for the purchase of the convent, school, and rectory. Again, the church is not for sale at this time. I will keep you posted in the bulletin as new events develop.

Work is scheduled to begin on replacing the **roof on the St. Ann's rectory** sometime in October. We are also looking to repair the St. Ann church roof which is leaking and damaging the plaster inside. Current cost estimates for repairs are coming in around \$3,000. All funds for the projects at St. Ann are coming from the St. Ann Building fund and donations.

Being trustworthy

At first glance when we hear the parable of the dishonest steward in our Gospel it seems strange that Jesus would hold up a crook as a good example. Yet we get a better glimpse of what Jesus is talking about when he says: "I tell you, make friends for yourselves with dishonest wealth, so that when it fails, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings." Dishonest wealth? Does that mean we are to steal from one and give to another? No, not only do we hear Jesus condemn dishonesty, which makes us untrustworthy, we hear in our first reading how much the Lord despises those who steal, especially from the poor.

When Jesus says to make friends with dishonest wealth, he is reminding us that when we use our time, talents, money and possessions for our own good, we are using what belongs to God. It is not ours. We are like the steward who uses his master's goods so as to endure his own future. We must be prudent with how we use the Divine Master's goods.

As disciples of Jesus, being prudent once again means acknowledging that all gifts come from God and are to be used for the greater good, not just for our own gain. The U.S. Bishops echo the importance of being prudent and just in their 2016 pastoral letter *Everyday Christianity*: "All human beings have unique talents, gifts from God, that we are called to develop and share ... People who use their skills and expertise for the common good, the service of others, and the protection of creation, are good stewards of the gifts they have been given."

The other lesson Jesus teaches us in this Gospel passage is about the importance of being trustworthy. When we labor with honesty, serve those in need, work for justice and contribute to charity, we use our talents to show our love – and God's love – for our brothers and sisters.

Jesus is trusting us with the small things – the worldly goods we have, our talents, our treasures. Let us strive each day to use them prudently, to make a difference in people's lives, to prove our trustworthiness by building up the Kingdom of God here on earth. That is wealth that will bring us into our eternal dwelling!
