Should you receive an unsolicited request for money or personal information – including a request for gift cards of any type – exercise extreme caution. Contact the person or entity by using official contact information only. Do not use contact information provided in the potential fraudulent request.

Praying for All Souls All Souls' Day, which we celebrated last Thursday, has been part of Catholic tradition for centuries and the way it is celebrated has changed over time and varies across cultures. The month of November serves as a powerful reminder for us to pray for all souls undergoing purification. Pope Francis has said that doing so "is the best spiritual help that we can give to their souls, particularly to those who are the most forsaken." (Angelus address, Nov. 2, 2014)

We can assist our loved ones with prayers – that they may be cleansed and purified, and enter eternal life in heaven. If we believe in Jesus and follow his path, we hope to one day find rest in the arms of our Lord. As Saint Paul reminds us in Scripture, *Hope does not disappoint*.

As we focus on praying for the faithful departed this month, the question of suffering seems to come up. Why do we suffer, what is the meaning of suffering? During the expressions of suffering that we witness or perhaps encounter ourselves we ask how could a loving and caring God let this happen?

Throughout history, many people have attempted to answer this burning question; for some, suffering is a divine punishment, for others a test or an opportunity to strengthen faith or to show heroic virtue or fidelity. Yet in the end, it remains a mystery – beyond our comprehension.

As Christians, we know that Jesus was "similarly ... tested in every way." At first glance this may not sound helpful, but when we look through the eyes of faith, we see that these words are not simply meant to explain suffering, but to help us realize that even in suffering there can be good.

The crucifixes we wear and that adorn our homes and churches are a constant reminder of the suffering that Jesus went through to justify us, to restore us to a right relationship with God.

While suffering cannot be avoided or even fully explained, we can begin to use it for a greater purpose, that is we can learn from it and, as people of faith, join our suffering to that of the Suffering Servant whom we now recognize as Christ. Then, our suffering may not seem so inscrutable or meaningless.

What gives us final hope is that not only did Jesus experience suffering, as we do, but he ultimately overcame it in the Resurrection.

It is harder to imagine a greater sense of good that results from our suffering than knowing we too will overcome it and share in the triumph of the resurrection with all the souls we are praying for this month.
