From the Desk of Deacon Jerry

There is a **Pastoral Planning** meeting this Thursday, March 30 at St. Mark Center on Grandview Blvd. The meeting is from 6:00 pm - 8:00 pm and will be attended by representatives from parishes in Erie. A group from our parish will also be attending and I will keep you updated on any developments.

Bishop Lawrence Persico, together with the priests of the Diocese of Erie, will celebrate the annual **Chrism Mass** on April 3 at 1 p.m. at St. Peter Cathedral, 230 W. 10th St., Erie. During the Mass, the holy oils to be used for sacraments will be consecrated and blessed for distribution to the parishes of the diocese. The public is encouraged to attend.

On Good Friday, April 7, Catholics throughout the world are asked to give generously to the **Pontifical Good Friday Collection** in support of our brothers and sisters in the Holy Land. Through the Good Friday Collection, you join with Catholics around the world in standing in solidarity with the Church in the Holy Land. Your support means that the Church there can conduct parish ministry, provide Catholic education, feed the hungry, build housing for Christians, maintain shrines and operate refugee centers.

Veiling statues and crosses: Many of us may remember going to church during Lent and seeing all the statues and crosses covered in purple cloth. In contemporary practice in the United States prior to Vatican II, churches were required to veil statues and crosses during the last two weeks of Lent, called Passiontide. Some parishes expanded that time frame to include the entirety of Lent, even though this was not the intent of the practice.

After Vatican II, the practice of veiling statues and crosses, if done at all, was left up to the decision of each country's conference of bishops. Most recently with the revised English translation of the third edition of the Roman Missal, the U.S. bishops have determined the following guideline and placed it in the Roman Missal as a rubric for the Fifth Sunday of Lent: "In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images throughout the church from this Sunday may be observed. Crosses remain covered until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil." It is important to note two things. First, this is an optional practice. And second, if a parish chooses to observe this practice, statutes and crosses cannot be veiled until the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Although Lent is a penitential season, it is not one that restricts us from the veneration of the saints in their images or of the cross in its glory. Rather, the practice of veiling statues and crosses during the final weeks of Lent helps us prepare for the fullness of joy at the Easter Triduum.

Do we believe? . . . What happens to me when I die, what is on the other side, will I see my loved ones again? These are questions all of us have pondered, especially when we confront our own mortality or the death of someone we love.

Our Gospel gives us a peek behind the mystery of life and death in the form of a scene that is a prelude to heaven and the final resurrection.

Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days when Jesus arrives in Bethany. There Martha and Mary appeal to him: Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. As much as she was consumed in grief over her brother's death, she still believes there is a reason to hope. Martha knows that <u>Jesus will shine a light into her darkness</u> and shows her faith by saying to Jesus: "Even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you."

Jesus makes the bold claim: "I am the resurrection and the life, Jesus says, whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live." He then turns to Martha and asks her: "Do you believe this?" The answer to that question defines the life and faith of each of us as believers.

Within today's gospel we find life that is stronger than death. The human reality of death affects Jesus in a way it had never done before. In this encounter he does not simply know death in an abstract way but in the fabric of his human life. He sees his friends mourn, even those who believe that death will one day be conquered. Faced with the loss that physical death brings, Jesus himself begins to cry. Jesus understands our suffering, our sorrows, our grief!

All this human suffering was turned around because of faith. Faith convinces us of Christ's victory over death. Faith in the Resurrection rests on faith in God who is God of the Living. Our Gospel is not just about Lazarus' resurrection, it's about *ours*.

We are reminded it is Jesus who can shine a light into our darkness. With him, we can overcome anything, even death itself. The tomb is empty and our hearts are full. Do we believe this?
