Seventy-seven times . . . One of the most central teachings of Jesus is that of forgiving and being forgiven. What does it mean to forgive someone? Or to be forgiven? This week Peter asks the question: "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive him?" For Peter it appears that forgiveness is an obligation. What are the rules? How many times do I have to forgive before I can stop? But Jesus sees it as a matter of love, not duty. Forgiveness must come from the heart, and we must model ourselves after the Father, whose mercy is infinite. As long as our brother or sister repents, we must forgive them. We know in our own lives that the call to be people of forgiveness is not easy. Sometimes it requires all the strength we have to muster up the courage, as well as the words and actions, that must follow. Forgiving does not mean that we endorse or accept the wrong others have done to us, rather it means we no longer harbor feelings of anger and resentment or seek ways of getting even. But when it comes to forgiving others, we must first remember just how forgiving and merciful God is to each of us. If God is so willing to forgive us, even when the debt of our sin is huge, how much more should we be willing to take the right step and forgive those who have harmed or hurt us? A good way to put this into practice is to regularly seek out and receive the sacrament of reconciliation or penance. These are not the times for us to be closed of heart; the world, our communities, and the Church, needs us. We must continue to recognize God's goodness and mercy that is shared with us again and again. Then we will find it easier to forgive others, not just once, not just seven times, but seventy-seven times.
