From the Desk of Deacon Jerry

There are no **Pastoral Planning** updates to report since the release of Bishop Persico's letter last week. As things develop and information becomes available, I will pass it on. Our annual **collection for retired priests** will take place TODAY. We ask that all the faithful of the diocese to prayerfully consider a financial gift to the Good Shepherd Collection, to assist us in the caring for our current and future retired priests. This collection offers you a way to show your gratitude for their many years of dedication and faithful service to the people of God in the Diocese of Erie.

Our **Knights Council** has joined together with 23 other Knights Councils in Erie and Crawford Counties to conduct our annual **Baby Bottle Fundraiser**. It will **benefit the Women's Care Center** of Erie's goal of purchasing a new, state of the art **Ultrasound Machine** to replace and older unit at one of their other locations. We Need the Good Shepherd!

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is often referred to as Good Shepherd Sunday as John's Gospel gives us what is perhaps the best known and most loved image of Jesus: The Good Shepherd. It is only in John's Gospel that Jesus calls himself the good shepherd.

So, what makes a shepherd good? For starters he is different from the hired hand who is in it mainly for the paycheck. A good shepherd goes beyond the job description, the minimum requirements of the job. A good shepherd's work is truly an act of love. A good shepherd protects his sheep, leads them to safety, feeds them, helps them to grow. Jesus our Good Shepherd does all of this for us and even more – he leads us by his voice and gives us his very own life so that each one of us may have life.

But Jesus gives all of us a challenge today – he asks each of us to be good shepherds and to take care of his flock on earth. To be more than hired hands – to go beyond the job description and to imitate Jesus, the Good Shepherd – to lead lives that are loving and caring, faithful and trustworthy, patient and understanding. So how well are we taking care of the flock Jesus has entrusted to us – are we good shepherds? "Do we shepherd his earth and treat it with care, or are we hired hands who feel no sense of ownership?" Do we shepherd his people and lead them to good pastures, or do we run away and worry only about ourselves? Do we lay down our lives for others by truly listening to others and not clinging to our own opinions? "Do we look upon everyone, the whole human race, as members of one flock, or do we look upon others as rivals, enemies?" "Do we gather ... or do we scatter?

Jesus promises us his continued care and protection and tells us why we can rely on him as the Good Shepherd. He seeks only our good while protecting us from the "thieves and robbers" which are in the form of the daily challenges we face.

Jesus our Good Shepherd can be found in our daily lives such as in health care workers whose work is done out of love for many people they serve. Or perhaps in teachers who go the extra mile to assure the success of that one troubled student. The Good Shepherd is in each one of us, as we strive to take care of those around us.

So, rest assured that no matter how this life challenges us Our Good Shepherd doesn't give up on us. He goes beyond the job description and takes ownership of his flock and is always there to lead us to better ground.

Jesus the Good Shepherd takes ownership of his flock and does not give up on us. Can we say the same for us?
