<u>Good Shepherd Sunday/Diocesan Priest Retirement Collection</u> The annual Good Shepherd Collection for retired priests of the Diocese of Erie will be taken up today, April 14 and next Sunday April 21. The Good Shepherd Collection allows each of us to show our gratitude and support of those priests who have cared for us and our spiritual needs and faithfully served our parishes. Among the list of retired priests, many have served and continue to serve in our parish.

Retired priests of the Diocese of Erie receive a monthly pension from the Diocesan Priest Retirement Fund and if they participated in Social Security another smaller monthly check. They use their pension for basic needs, such as food, housing and transportation. The skyrocketing cost for medical services, prescription drugs, long-term care and gaps in Medicare coverage have resulted in some of these priests over the years exhausting their savings for expenses of health care and absolute essentials. Thus, there is a pressing need to support those priests with supplementary assistance with their expenses for non-insured medical costs and long-term care costs. As the number of retired priest's increases, the Priest Retirement Plan needs to grow to meet their future needs.

Please prayerfully reflect this week on how you can best respond in support of the needs of our Diocesan Retired Priests. Use the special collection envelope for the Good Shepherd Collection. Please return in the second collection next weekend or drop it off at the Parish Office. The collection for Retired Religious that was taken up in December does not benefit our Diocesan priests.

Prayer for our Retired Priests: We pray for the retired priests of our Diocese that they may experience peace and joy in their retirement for the countless years of service they have provided and continue to provide to the people of God.

Jesus takes away our fear!

In our Gospel this week we find the Apostles huddled up in the Upper Room where the Last Supper took place. They are hiding for fear that those who killed Jesus will soon be looking for them.

Fear is a very common and real emotion and we all fall into its grasp at one time or another. And when we do it often causes us to think irrationally and not behave as we normally should. The disciples certainly experienced this when Jesus appeared in their midst as they were listening to the two disciples recount what had taken place on the way.

But Jesus calms their fear by offering the peace that he alone can give. He reassures them he is not a ghost and they are not hallucinating. Rather, they are seeing victory, not defeat – that he is truly risen. He eats with them, and then gives them a detailed account of the Scriptures. Recounting of how prophesies from the Hebrew Scriptures have all been fulfilled by his passion.

It is easy for us to allow fear and doubt to control us. Yet we must never let them have the last word: Jesus always calms our fears and reassures us of the truth and reality of the Resurrection, and its offer of new life. We can find that reassurance right here in the sacramental and liturgical life of the Church where the Scriptures are proclaimed and the Spirit works in us. Even if we are unable to be physically present at Mass,

we can find this assurance in our private prayer and the time we spend with Jesus. It is here that we encounter the Risen Jesus. It is here that he removes our fears and doubts and frees us to go out and share the Good News that he has conquered sin and death. We fear no more!
