We are still growing!

Sir Edmund Hillary was the first person to climb Mount Everest. On May 29, 1953, he scaled what was then the highest known mountain -29,000 feet straight up. He was knighted for his efforts and many may even remember the American Express Card commercials he made as a result of the fame he gained from the climb. It was his book, High Adventure, that really opened up Hillary's true experiences. In the book he writes that "in 1952 I started up the mountain on my first attempt and failed. A few weeks later I was asked to address a group in England and was received with a thunderous applause. The audience was recognizing my attempt at greatness but I saw myself as a failure because I had not reached my goal. I moved from the microphone, walked to the edge of the platform from which I was speaking, made a fist and pointed at a picture of the mountain and said in a loud voice, "Mount Everest, you beat me the first time, but I'll beat you the next time because you've grown all you are going to grow but I am still growing." Sir Hillary, faced with insurmountable circumstances achieved his goal through persistence.

All of us face the trials, tribulations and setbacks in this journey of life here on earth and often it feels like we are trying to climb Mount Everest, a daunting and difficult endeavor. Occasionally, just like Sir Hillary, we don't overcome our obstacles the first time and it seems easier to just give in and accept our failures as the inevitable consequences of life.

Our Scripture readings for this Sunday give us a good lesson in persistence and growth. In our Gospel Jesus tells us that we must be persistent in our prayer and he goes so far as to show us how to pray. But he went beyond just giving us words to teach his disciples and us what prayer really is: seeking God's presence in our lives and what God really wants for us.

Don't we all at one time or another all feel our prayers are not answered or God isn't listening. Jesus teaches us that prayer is more than asking for something, it is the search for God and his divine presence in our lives – it is about allowing ourselves to grow in the divine love that God instills in us.

In our Gospel the disciples realize that there is something more to their relationship to Jesus - something only he can reveal to them. As they watch Jesus pray, they begin to grow in their awareness of who Jesus is and they recognize their own vital need to pray. They learn that they cannot know Jesus Christ completely until they pray like him - and with him.

So, it goes with us! As we persist and grow in our prayer, we know God because we discover that spending time talking about God is not a substitute for talking with God.

The answers to our prayers do not always look like what we expect and when Jesus asks who would give a scorpion instead of an egg, or a snake instead of a fish, our first thought is "No one would ever do that." The scorpion or snake are actually answered prayers, as God answers prayer according to His will, not ours. When we pray "Give us each day our daily bread," we are the man in the Gospel knocking on the door of his neighbor. God hears us, even if we get discouraged.

Today, let us shake our fists at the Mount Everest in our lives, those obstacles that hold us back from being the person God wants us to be. As we pray the Our Father, let us knock on the door and present our cares and concerns to God and resolve to do so over and over again knowing our persistence will pay off. Our mountains are no longer growing, but we are.
