Don't Worry! ... In the Gospel for this week's Traditional Latin Mass (Matthew 6: 24-33) Jesus talks about something that we all do too much of as of late – that is we worry. It seems that worry is becoming our default state. In our Gospel, Jesus tells us not to worry about our life, what we will eat or drink, our body or what we will wear. Yet on any given day it is likely we have worried about these very things. Even when we do our best not to worry, there are plenty of circumstances beyond our control that we run into every day. So what is the secret to getting through our daily lives without being consumed by worry and anxiety? Jesus points to the answer. He wants us to come to the realization that we are not in control, rather God is and the cure for excessive worry is to let go and trust God. This is not always an easy thing to do. When we are in a state of worry and anxiety it is often tempting to feel that no one has our best interests at heart, and can give

the cure for excessive worry is to let go and trust God. This is not always an easy thing to do. When we are in a state of worry and anxiety it is often tempting to feel that no one has our best interests at heart, and can give us what we really need. And don't we all feel the need to be in control of things! Yet we are told there is no need to worry! How is it that God expects us not to worry? We live in the real world, where bills have to be paid, family members get sick and unfortunate circumstances arise. Jesus is not saying that we should ignore these things rather, he is telling us not to be mastered by them. It is in serving two or more masters that drives much of our anxiety. Jesus reminds us that when we try to serve two masters, we will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. So, what do these masters look like? When we worry excessively about shelter and food, we no longer just work for a living, we let fear master us, and we become convinced we do not have enough. When we worry about what others think or say about us, we end up serving the masters of pride and self-doubt. We worry about education, safety, our health – you name it! –we subordinate ourselves to a master who compels us to ensure we obtain those things. Each time we serve these masters we sacrifice something of ourselves in unhealthy or unholy ways. We end up giving up a precious part of ourselves that is sacred and holy for something else that is not. In today's world, we often take on too much responsibility. And in trying to "have it all," we can really actually lose much of it. The sooner we realize we are not in control, the closer we are to being free. Jesus is asking us to trust in the love that God has for each one of us; to have faith in God's goodness; and patience in his power to provide what we need. When we place our faith in God's providence, we become less dependent on excessive worry and we have greater clarity in our thinking to navigate through our daily lives and to take up the mission of Christ.
