CHILD PROTECTION AND CREATING SAFE **ENVIRONMNETS—National CyberTipline:** National Center for Missing and Exploited Children's CyberTipline is the nation's centralized reporting system for the online exploitation of children. Anyone can make reports of suspected online enticement of children for sexual acts, molestation, child pornography, child sex tourism, child sex trafficking (includes prostitution), child sextortion and unsolicited obscene materials sent to a child. Misleading domain names, misleading words or digital images on the internet can also be reported to the CyberTipline. NCMEC staff review each tip and work to find a potential location for the incident reported so that it may be made available to the appropriate lawenforcement agency for possible investigation. NCMEC provides resources/help in removing an online image. Reports can be made 24 hours a day, seven days a week online at www.cybertipline.org or by calling 800-843-5678. Visit https://www.eriercd.org/childprotection/ to see what the diocese is doing to maintain safe environments for children and youth.

ADORATION

With the absence of Masses during this pandemic, it is a wonderful time to stop in at church and spend time in Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.



I heard a priest last week state that our church is a tabernacle, so if our church is not open then go to the parking lot and spend time in Adoration. Adoration is a wonderful way to spend time with our Lord. How often do you spend time in adoration? Below are some ideas that you can practice during your private time with our Lord. If being at the church is not something you can do, then use a crucifix and sit in Adoration in the comfort of your home.

- 1. Spend time just in silence and listen to the Lord speaking to you.
- 2. Be attentive: It is not just a reading time but you may use prayers from the Parish App or a bible.
- 3. Be Alert: Kneel or sit respectfully. If you get sleepy, stand up.
- 4. There is no one way to pray during Adoration; feel free to configure to your needs.
- 5. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you, then make acts of faith, hope and charity.
- 6. Tell God how you believe, trust and love him.
- 7. Ask for more faith, hope and love.
- 8. Pray the rosary.
- 9. Tell God: Oh my God, I adore Your divine greatness from the depths of my littleness; You are so great, and I am so small.

Contrition: Offer reparation. Examine your conscience. Imagine or look at Jesus on the cross. If you need to go to confession you may call your priest for an appointment. (814)789-2022

Meditation: Contemplate God's action. Meditate on the Stations of the Cross.

Thanksgiving: Express your gratitude for all of God's gifts that he has blessed you with.

Petition God: Ask God for what you and others need. For you, your family, your church family, our country, the world, etc.

Final: Make a resolution to act on a light of the Holy Spirit that you received, maybe something doable and checkable. Ask the Blessed Mother to help you, perhaps with Marian prayers or a rosary.

Unbabbling Babel

he proud people of the city of Babel decided to build an enormous tower, one so big that it would go straight up to heaven. God saw them building this tower and decided to put a stop to it. Suddenly, everyone who was working on the tower spoke a different language. (Imagine how confusing it was!) And the tower of Babel never was completed.

On Pentecost, what happened at Babel is reversed. The Holy Spirit comes down and teaches everyone one

On Pentecost, we celebrate the "seven gifts" of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, understanding, counsel, strength, knowledge, piety and respect. And we celebrate the "twelve fruits" of those gifts: charity, joy, peace, patience, benignity, goodness, endurance, mildness, faith, modesty, continence and chastity. Look up these words in the dictionary.


virtues are powerful and rare in today's world.

A Fiery Finale

Spirit. Eastertime ends with the sound of wind, tongues of fire, instant understanding and enough Spirit to launch a church.

Celebrate the fire of the Spirit. Wear fire colors on Pentecost: oranges, reds, hot pinks. Pass around sparklers. Invite the neighbors to a barbecue. Celebrate the wind of the Spirit: Hang wind chimes, wind socks, flags and mobiles, or go fly a kite!

At Christmas, many people decorate their homes with evergreens; at Easter, people use flowers. At Pentecost, it's the custom to decorate the house with fresh, green branches, grasses and reeds to welcome the summer. Pentecost flowers are fragrant roses, irises, poppies and peonies—or any flower with a delicious aroma. On Saturday, Pentecost Eve, get together ingredients for

Sunday's dessert: 30 large strawberries, washed and dried, 1 regular box of instant vanilla pudding, 1 cup of milk, ½ of a pint of whipping cream and 1 orange.

On Sunday, before dinner, combine the pudding mix and the 1 cup of milk, and blend. Whip the cream and fold into the pudding. Grate the orange peel onto a sheet of

Waxed paper.

Line up the strawberries, point up, and cut an X halfway down. With a spoon, fill the Xs with pudding, mounding it over the top. Sprinkle each with the grated peel, and refrigerate until serving.

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
