Each day join us on our Facebook Page for a *Cooped Up Catholic Scavenger Hunt*. A clue will be given daily on the page. You will need to find the clue, figure out the answer and post a picture with the answer. For example: if the answer is a cross, take a picture of you or your family holding or standing by a cross and post the picture. Be creative, we want to see all the smiling faces we miss seeing each week! This scavenger hunts takes place through Pentecost Sunday, May 31st. CHILD PROTECTION AND CREATING SAFE ENVIRONMENTS—Child Abuse Prevention Month: The "Creating A Safe Environment" training program is an integral component to the prevention effort in our diocese. The mandated program trains employees and volunteers in the warning signs of abuse and how to report suspected abuse of a minor. Since 2003 over 59,000 adults in the diocese have received the training to recognize and report child abuse. With the help of the safe environment training program, the faithful are guided and educated about the responsibility to keep God's children protected and safe.

**GRAINS**—wheat, rice, barley, oats, corn — are powerful symbols of life, death and resurrection. During the Three Days of Easter, Good Friday to Easter Sunday, we followed the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus. Jesus was like a grain of wheat that was buried in the earth. Jesus rose to new life. In all of us who are baptized, one grain becomes a hundred grains.

On the second Monday of Eastertime, Greek farming families celebrate *colyva*. This also is celebrated 40 days after a funeral. To greet the resurrection, Greeks boil wheat until it is tender and plump, then they mix in raisins, almonds and sesame seeds. This mixture is called a pilaf. It is heaped on a platter, decorated with candied fruit and flowers, and circled with fragrant, fresh herbs.

Make your own *colyva* with a package of wheat or rice pilaf from the grocery. Follow box directions and add ½ cup of raisins, ½ cup of slivered almonds and ½ cup of sesame seeds. Mound on a platter and decorate with dried apricots, apples, dates, candied cherries or pineapple. To finish, circle the platter with fresh mint from the garden or basil and rosemary from the supermarket.

Some people use silver cake decorations, called "dragees," to form a cross on the *colyva*. Many Greek families bring *colyva* and Easter eggs to the cemetery, where they have a picnic to bring the good news of Easter to all who sleep there like planted grain, and who are waiting for resurrection.

## What is Spiritual Communion?

"Spiritual Communion is a centuries-old Christian practice of desiring union with Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. It is used as a preparation for Holy Mass and by individuals who cannot receive Holy Communion." Spiritual Communion can be made in simple words of one's own or by using prayers already written by saints and other spiritual guides.

## Sample Prayers for Spiritual Communion

Cardinal Raphael Merry Del Val: At Thy feet, O my Jesus, I prostrate myself and I offer Thee repentance of my contrite heart, which is humbled in its nothingness and in Thy holy presence. I adore Thee in the Sacrament of Thy love, the ineffable Eucharist. I desire to receive Thee into the poor dwelling that my heart offers Thee. While waiting for the happiness of sacramental communion, I wish to possess Thee in spirit. Come to me, O my Jesus, since I, for my part, am coming to Thee! May Thy love embrace my whole being in life and in death. I believe in Thee, I hope in Thee, I love Thee. Amen

**Traditional:** My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

Modern: Jesus, life is crazy! So many people are relying on me, but I don't know what to do myself. I know that you promised to be with us always, to walk with me and provide for me and those I love. And I believe that promise is true - especially in the Eucharist. Right now we can't go to Mass, but I love you and want to be close to you, now more than ever. Please come spiritually into my heart. Give me all the grace and help you would give if I were receiving you physically. Never let me be separated from you. Hove you, Jesus. Amen

Spiritual Communion is as simple as choosing to unite your heart with Jesus' Heart in the Holy Eucharist. If you would like to take time to make the moment special, chose some or all of the following suggestions:

#### Location

Make your physical location special by placing objects and images that remind you of God's love on a table (e.g. candle, sacred art, statue, flower, photo, etc.). If praying with children, ask them to contribute items.

Make the area around you as quiet as possible or play music that helps you focus on God's presence.

#### Listen

Spend time listening to God's Word. You could use the daily Mass readings or choose an excerpt from one of the Gospels or Psalms. You could also find Mass on TV, radio, or live-streamed internet.

Reflect. Spend quiet time in conversation with God, journal, or discuss the Scripture with friends or family.

#### Connect

Let Jesus know that you love him, desire to be united to him, and offer your whole life to him. Use one of the sample prayers (above) or make up one of your own.

Make the intention of uniting your spiritual communion to the Masses being said throughout the world.
