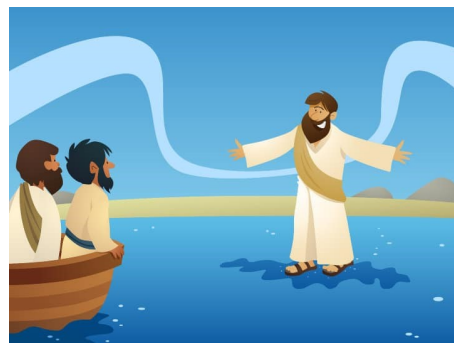

WHOLE COMMUNITY CATECHESIS

Who is Saint Hippolyte?

That question is asked often. Can't find him in your Dictionary of the Saints? Try looking under Hippolytus. Early documents show that the Roman Catholic Church in Frenchtown was dedicated to Saint Hippolytus. How, why or when the name evolved into "Hippolyte" is a mystery, but it's been that way a very long time and nobody is about to change it now.



The life of Saint Hippolytus is somewhat of a mystery itself. He was born around 170 AD. A priest in the Church of Rome during the late second and early third century, Hippolytus had a strict idea about how people should live. Until the 1851 publishing of his works titled "Philosophumena," also known as "A Refutation of all Heresies," not much was known about him. Most authorities do agree that he was born in the eastern Empire. He later moved to Rome, becoming a leading writer on Christian theology and worship. Hippolytus was a harsh critic of anyone that did not live up to his demanding standards.

During the reign of Pope Zephyrinus (198-217) he got into a conflict with him and the Church of Rome on account of Christological opinions that were causing controversies in Rome. Hippolytus combated the heresies and false doctrines of Theodotion, the Alogi, Noetus, Epigonus, Cleomenes, and Sabellius who saw the Father and the Son as only manifestations of God. Hippolytus believed in a real difference between the Son and the Father, with the Son being Divine but also completely separate from and subordinate to the Father.

When Pope Zephyrinus declined to give a decision on the matter, Hippolytus censured him and called him unworthy to rule the Church of Rome. He also called the Pope a tool in the hands of the deacon Callistus. After Zephyrinus died, Callistus was elected Pope (217-218). Declaring Pope Callistus too lenient in disciplinary and doctrinal matters, Hippolytus instantly left the communion of the Roman Church. He was then elected as the first antipope.

Fifteen years and three pontificates later, anti-Christian emperor Maximinus sentenced both Hippolytus and Pope Pontian to death. They were sent to the penal colony of Sardinia in 235. It was there that they reconciled their differences before their deaths. The following year on August 13, Pope Fabian brought their remains back to Rome for a solemn burial. Pontianus was solemnly interred in the papal vault in the catacomb of Callistus. Hippolytus was interred in a vault in a cemetery on the Via Tiburtina.

His statue was placed in the Vatican Library by Pope John XXIII in 1959. Hippolytus is credited with being the author of Eucharistic Prayer II. His feast day is August 13th, and his Saint Emblem is a horse.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus reads a passage from the prophet Isaiah to announce that he has been sent "to proclaim liberty to captives" (Lk 4:18).

Unfortunately, human captivity remains a real challenge throughout the world. Human trafficking in Brazil, for example, is a serious problem that takes numerous forms: forced rural labor that amounts to modern-day slavery, trafficking to support prostitution, and forced marriages. The Church in Brazil is addressing this challenge by training leaders to publicize and denounce trafficking practices and to work with all levels of government to combat human trafficking.

In November 2018, the National Conference of Bishops of Brazil hosted a workshop in Brasília for 45 people, including bishops, priests, religious brothers and sisters, and lay people from 17 regions of the country. Participants attended presentations on the roots of human trafficking in Brazil, on sexual abuse and exploitation, and on the challenges inherent in the work to combat human trafficking. This valuable project, supported by the Collection for the Church in Latin America, trained regional leaders in Catholic social doctrine—especially teachings on human trafficking and human and environmental development—as well as Brazilian government and international anti-trafficking policies.

These regional leaders will now, in turn, conduct workshops to train 400 people as agents to address the causes of human trafficking in their own regions—such as the migration of vulnerable people from Venezuela—as well as to develop plans for prevention and victim assistance.

By supporting the Collection for the Church in Latin America, you are helping Brazilians fulfill their Gospel call to protect the vulnerable, defend human life and dignity, and address the causes of human trafficking throughout the country.
