



The Solemnity of All Saints NOVEMBER 1, 2020



All Hallows' Day, the Solemnity of All Saints, or All Saints' Day is a celebration of all Catholic saints held on November 1 each year. "On this solemnity, we recall the holy men and women who, having completed their earthly journeys, now live forever with God. These saints, though not canonized, offer us models of abiding faith and love of God and neighbor" (Essential Guide to Seasons and Saints, 109).

In the Catholic Church, we are called to imitate and venerate saints because of their heroically virtuous lives, martyrdom, or their



offering of life for others. But, what does veneration mean and why do we pray to the saints?

Veneration of the saints fosters our faith in God and does not detract from it. Rather, our faith in God is strengthen by our relationship with our brothers and sisters in the faith who are in heaven. The Church teaches that by imitating the virtues lived by the saints, the saints brings us closer to Christ. When we ask the saints to pray for us, we ask them to join their wills with the will of God and intercede for us here on earth. This is the Communion of Saints which we profess every Sunday in the Creed. In his homily on the Solemnity of All Saints in 2015, Pope Francis said,

Let us ask the Lord for the grace to be simple and humble people, the grace to be able to weep, the grace to be meek, the grace to work for justice and peace, and above all the grace to let ourselves be forgiven by God so as to become instruments of his mercy.

This is what the Saints did, those who have preceded us to our heavenly home. They accompany us on our earthly pilgrimage, they encourage us to go forward. May their intercession help us to walk on Jesus' path, and to obtain eternal happiness for our deceased brothers and sisters, for whom we offer this Mass.

November 1-7 is National Vocations Awareness Week!

We pray for all those discerning their vocations as holy priests, deacons and consecrated men and women.

Why Should We Pray the Rosary?

Are you sick and tired of turning on the news and seeing nothing but violence and mayhem? If so, there's something you can do about it. The following is a story told about a priest who had attended an international gathering of Christians from across the world.

The ambassador from Japan, approached the priest and said to him, "War is your fault." Stunned, the priest asked him what he meant. The ambassador said, **"You Catholics, all of you—we do not have peace in the world! It is your fault."** After the priest asked him why he blamed us, he said, "I've read about this. The Lady came to you at Fatima, right? That's what you believe? She told you what to do, to secure peace in the world. Well, there's no peace in the world, so obviously you Catholics haven't done it. She came to you Catholics, not to Hindus, not to Buddhists. It is your responsibility."

What was the ambassador talking about? He was talking about Our Blessed Mother when she appeared to the three children of Fatima, Portugal, in 1917. She told the children to pray, pray, pray, to fast, and do penances. She told them we would never have world peace unless we pray the Rosary. She told them to pray it every day.

Are you wondering where we got the Rosary and why we need to pray it? The rosary is a weapon against Satan, who fears it. Mary would give it to us to help us win the battle waged against us. Many saints would testify to its power (miracles) and reveal many blessings attributed to saying it. We receive great merits when we say it fervently, with great love and trust, meditating on the Sacred Mysteries. Praying the rosary makes reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and relieves souls in purgatory.

In our rosary class we learned that the Rosary is a weapon given to us by God that took many centuries to develop. Our Blessed Mother has given it to us through her appearance to St. Dominic (who preached in many parts of the world in the 13th Century with little success) when she told him to preach her Psalter and revealed to him the specific Mysteries to meditate on while praying it. She told him that the only way to defeat Satan is the Paschal Mystery of her son, Jesus Christ. The Sacred Mysteries of His life, death, and resurrection have the power to conquer evil and set souls free. The culmination of Ave Maria and preaching the mysteries of Christ would then lead to meditation and conversion. This method would be a spiritual sword in his hands, giving him the ability to win hearts back to Christ, vanquishing Lucifer, and souls given eternal life in the Kingdom of God. Our Lady directed Dominic to take it to the streets so it would become a weapon of mass conversion.

Mary desires to serve the King and help all her spiritual children be fully conformed to the likeness of her Son (to become holy). Satan knows all that she does and he hates it! (Rev 12:17; 1 Pt 5:8) Down through the centuries the evil one (Satan) would earnestly strive to destroy it through a variety of means, beginning with an attack against its founder (St. Dominic) and his association, by burning its documentary evidence, by instilling doubts of its importance in the hearts of men. But God would inspire books to be written about it to defend its tradition and show that it is both reliable and true. (Read <u>The Secret of the Rosary</u> by St. Louis de Montfort, or <u>10 wonders of the Rosary</u> or <u>Champions of the Rosary</u> by Donald Calloway).

Down through the centuries many miracles have happened after people have prayed the Rosary. One of the most recent you can watch on <u>www.youtube.com</u>. Type on the search bar Bishop Oliver Dashe Doeme's account of Jesus appearing to him in Nigeria, and handing him a "sword" in 2014. Read Google accounts of wars that were won after praying the rosary, such as The Battle of LePanto, or read about Our Lady of Las Lajas. Did you know that Jesuit priests survived the bombing of Hiroshima with no side effects and their building left standing, while everything else was destroyed by the bomb? They were praying the Rosary.

Many saints have been given to us to show us the way to live. Many have told us how important the Rosary is to help us grow in our spiritual life, how to become holy. Some examples include: St. Pope John Paul II (who said the rosary was his favorite prayer and had a great devotion to Our blessed Mother. He believed that Mary saved him when he was shot). Maximilian Kolbe, who gave his life to save another at Auschwitz. He loved the Blessed Mother. Sr. Lucia who was one of the children of Fatima. Mary told her to learn to read and write so she could spread the Rosary. Mother Teresa of Calcutta, St. Louis de Montfort, Venerable Fulton Sheen, Venerable Patrick Peyton, Venerable Mary of Agreda, St. George Preka, and many others prayed the rosary and wrote about it.

Our Church in the world today is in great need of Saints! We need people to pray the Rosary! When the Rosary takes root in our souls, changes happen, grace flows. Satan is crushed. It is God's will that we pray. The Virgin Mary, being efficient and so wise, has chosen the Rosary as the key to unlock the doors to our hearts. When praying it with sincerity, your love for God is increased, your openness to the Holy Spirit is increased, your ability to overcome temptation is increased, you have an interior peace, you have greater confidence in God's providence, you have consolation in times of darkness, you have a greater zeal and love for the sacraments, you have inspiration of random things that only God could have done. And you crown Mary with spiritual roses. (where the name Rosary is from) In short, there is great merit in praying the Rosary, even when you don't want to say it, but take the time.
