Dear SMS Families and Friends,

In late November, a teacher asked about when to start lessons and decorate for Christmas. I wanted to share my reply with you:

I'd like for you to hold off on Christmas. I really would like for the students to experience Advent this year in a more meaningful way. The Church, in her wisdom, gave us this whole season for a very special reason. It really helps to build up the anticipation and prepare hearts and minds for the true meaning of Christmas: Christ coming on Christmas and preparing for his second coming. Our kids are going to be bombarded with secular Christmas throughout December (and probably already are now!). We don't cultivate silence and patience enough in our modern world, and we so desperately need both.



We want our school to be fundamentally different from what our public-school students are receiving, and keeping the main thing the main thing is where we need to start.

There are fun Advent Saints and traditions that we'll be celebrating throughout Advent: St Nicholas, Our Lady of Guadalupe, St Lucy, our Advent prayer services (all on your December calendar). Let's please save Christmas for the week of December 18.

If you'd like to put up a tree or a manger scene at the beginning of Advent, that is ok - but build it as the weeks go on. Start with a bare tree, just a shepherd figure or the stable, and SLOWLY add to it until the last piece is put on on December 21.

Another thing our society doesn't have quite right is the timing of the Christmas season. It's assumed that the season is the month of December and the 12 days END on Christmas Day. That's actually backwards! Day 1 of Christmas IS Christmas Day. When we return from Christmas/New Year's break, we will still be in the Christmas season. It ends on the Sunday after the Feast of the Epiphany (usually the second Sunday of January). Please: do NOT take down Christmas before it's over, but also let's not jump ahead.

*I invite you, SMS Families and Friends, to join with us this Advent, in quieting your hearts, minds, and homes - building that anticipation and space in your heart to welcome Jesus in a new way this Christmas!

- adored Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament on First Friday,
- exercised our civic duty by voting on Election Day (in the running were Batman, Superman, and Captain America for favorite superhero - Batman won! AND chicken nuggets, pizza, and mac and cheese - pizza won!),
- completed our first grading period and passed out report cards,
- enjoyed a Spaghetti Dinner and basket raffle sponsored by the PTO,
- learned about how to best take care of our bodies and report to an adult if something is wrong with the help of our friends from AWARE,
- created Christmas ornaments and decorated a tree that is now on display at the Greenville Historical Society in the Waugh House,
- celebrated with Krystal Williams for WINNING the Patriots Pen Essay!!!
- started a schoolwide WORDLE game on an interactive bulletin board created by Mrs. Maloney,
- 🗫 made crafts and Thanksgiving cards with our Saint Houses for the homebound of our parish,
- * raised money for Hunters Sharing the Harvest (\$116.10), our November's Casual for a Cause,
- 🌲 changed into red shirts after Mass on November 17 to participate in Homelessness Awareness Day,
- listened to and learned from alumni and son of Mrs. Sue Stanfa, our PreK4 Aide, Nick Stanfa via Zoom. Nick works with people experiencing homelessness in Boulder, CO,
- welcomed parents to parent teacher conferences teaming with them to help their child become the best version of themselves this year,
- celebrated Thanksgiving with a friendship feast in PreK,
- raised money for our own school in an EXTRA Casual for a Cause (\$105) to benefit our Nature Studies and Science Program,
- gathered as a school family to share what we are thankful for this year (students each received a leaf that they wrote what they were thankful for and added it to a school tree),
- enjoyed a long Thanksgiving break and came back ready and renewed to learn,
- sent our K-7th Grade teachers to St. Leo's School in Ridgway to observe, collaborate and learn from and with the teachers there who have been immersed in Catholic Liberal Education (sometimes called Classical) for 8 years,
- celebrated our students with Shamrock Shoutouts,
- and, of course, continued the wondrous adventure of learning in all our subjects this year!



I ssked each teacher to share something fun they did in November with our students. Here's a little peek into our classrooms:

- PreK3 with Mrs. Forsythe learned what nocturnal animals are, talked about what they were thankful for, and learned the story of Jesus feeding the 5,000 with the five loaves and two fish.
- PreK4 with Mrs. Dorio measured, mixed, and made mac and cheese! They also shared what they were thankful for and thanked God for their blessings.
- PreK4 with Mr. Neral learned about the history of Thanksgiving and the Bible story of Jesus feeding the 5,000.
- Kindergarten with Mrs. Toy learned about the history of the first Thanksgiving! They also learned all about Mama Mary (the Blessed Mother) in Religion with Miss Zgonc.
- 1st Grade with Mrs. Maloney started reading Frog and Toad, learned all about Greek mythology, explored nature using our 5 senses, and started learning about the human body. They also started decomposing their pumpkin from Halloween, so stay tuned to find out what happens!
- 2nd Grade with Miss Zuschlag celebrated Thanksgiving with Balloons on Broadway. They also learned the Ten Commandments and Act of Contrition with Deacon Marty in Religion.

- 3rd Grade with Mrs. Endicott read Squanto and The Miracle of Thanksgiving. In Math, they started multiplication and in Religion, they read the book Who Was Jesus?.
- 4th Grade with Mrs. Knicely studied Good Habits in Religion and learned that exercising our conscience is a gift from God. In Science, they became Petrologists; exploring, identifying, and categorizing (igneous, metamorphic, and sedimentary) rocks!
- 7th Grade with Deacon Marty removed flags from the graves of veterans and held a flag burning ceremony. In Literature, they finished reading The Hobbit! They also explored the world of negative and positive integers, decimals, fractions, and mixed numbers in Math!
- Music classes with Mrs. Giffone sang and learned songs about thankfulness and pumpkin pie! Choir and band classes also marched along!
- Gym classes with Mrs. Giffone played turkey games!
- 4th Grade Art classes with Mrs. Cawley finished some beautiful watercolor leaf observations.

Mary on the Mantle

"Bringing Hope to the Caribbean, Inc. is a Bible based Christian organization created to meet the Spiritual and physical needs of the poverty-stricken people in the Caribbean; specifically focusing on the area of Hispaniola. We provide families in the Dominican Republic with goats, chickens and share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We also build a relationship with the families and mentor them both on how to raise the goat and the chickens in order that they can create a sustainable income for their family."
