MEMORIAL OF JOHN EUDES, PRIEST God cares through your hands

During the plagues of 1627 and 1631, John Eudes cared for the sick, sleeping in a field to avoid infecting his fellow priests. Similar efforts made today are honored by World Humanitarian Day, commemorating 22 United Nations staff killed by a terrorist attack in Baghdad in 2003. Since then, more than 4,000 aid workers have been injured, kidnapped, or killed, targeted as they served more than 65 million people displaced from their homes and more than 26,000 civilians killed or injured in six countries. MEMORIAL OF BERNARD, ABBOT, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Saintly? It's complicated

Bernard of Clairvaux was a brilliant and charismatic leader of the Cistercian monastic reform that encouraged a return to the original Benedictine life of prayer and manual labor. At the same time he was friend and mentor to powerful church leaders and was drawn into the geopolitical struggles embodied in the Crusades. How to reconcile the image of the prayerful monk with that of spiritual cheerleader to a militant army of Crusaders? Church history is filled with contradictions—as is each one of us. We have the simple contemplative and the militant crusader living in our own heart. Which one shall we nurture?

TODAY'S READINGS: Judges 6:11-24a; Matthew 19:23-30 (420). "Amen, I say to you, it will be hard for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of heaven."

MEMORIAL OF PIUS X, POPE Be a warm-hearted believer

Pope Pius X pastored the universal church from 1903 to 1914, a tumultuous period in world history, which saw traditional ways of life giving way, whether in the natural sciences, politics, or economic life, to new ways of thinking, organizing, believing. Though most commonly remembered as a staunch traditionalist and "anti-modernist," Pius should also be remembered for his simple, unpretentious lifestyle (he never lost sight of his poor

roots), his personal warmth and love of children, and his generous charitable outreach. After the horrific Messina earthquake of 1908, the most destructive earthquake ever recorded in Europe with some 100,000 casualties, Pius is said by one source to have filled the Apostolic Palace with refugees long before the Italian government acted. Make sure a warm heart is front and center in your own life of faith.

MEMORIAL OF THE QUEENSHIP OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY The sky is not the limit

Lumen gentium, Vatican II's Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, declares the "Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all guilt of original sin, on the completion of her earthly sojourn, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen of the Universe." Going to Orlando, Florida anytime soon? Visit the Basilica of the National Shrine of Mary, Queen of the Universe, a 2,000-seat church dedicated to the Queenship of Mary and established to serve the 30 million tourists who visit the Orlando area every year. Caught up in prayer

If you met Jesus face-to-face and he saw right through you straight into your soul—and told you exactly what you had been doing before meeting him, what would he see and what would he say? 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Marriage Matters August 2019

YOU SAY TOMATO, I SAY MARRIAGE.

We have covered many topics in this newsletter about the subject of marriage, but we have not really reflected in any depth on what marriage is. We will therefore look this month at the canonical definition of marriage and what kinds of marriages there are.

Canon 1055 §1 defines marriage as a "partnership of the whole of life ... which is ordered by its nature to the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of children." Canon 1056 fleshes this definition out by identifying the essential properties of marriage: unity and indissolubility. So, by its very nature, marriage is an exclusive and permanent covenant established between a man and a woman for their good and the good of having and raising children. This is a matter of divine law (Matthew 19:3-9), and no human power on earth, including the pope, can change it.

Notice that nothing in the above definition mentions anything about being Catholic, or being Christian, or being married in the Church. Marriage is a natural institution that predates and goes far beyond Christianity, and we recognize Non-Christian and Non-Catholic marriages. This is why even Non-Catholics and Non-Christians who have a prior marriage and wish to enter a new marriage in the Catholic Church or who are in a second or subsequent marriage and wish to come into the Church through the RCIA must have the validity of any prior marriages resolved through the annulment process. All marriages are by definition permanent, for life, and exclusive, between one man and one woman, and, unless and until God changes that, we must uphold it for everyone, Catholics and Non-Catholics alike.

Marriage according to the above, universally applicable definition is commonly referred to as natural marriage. All marriages that are truly marriages are therefore natural marriages, but some natural marriages also sacramental are marriages. Canon 1055 §1 states that the natural institution of marriage "has been raised by Christ to the dignity of a sacrament between the baptized."

The next paragraph goes even further: 'For this reason, a valid matrimonial contract cannot exist between the baptized without it being by that fact a sacrament." This means that any valid marriage between the baptized is not only natural but sacramental. "Baptized" here means any baptized Christians, including Non-Catholics. So, if two baptized Non-Catholics marry, their marriage is sacramental according to the Catholic Church, even if they do not believe that marriage is sacrament themselves. а While this understanding of marriage may raise certain theological questions, the distinction between a merely natural marriage and а sacramental marriage is important for certain canonical procedures, the explanation of which goes beyond the limits of this newsletter.

That's it for now. Next time we will look at some other kinds of marriages. Until then, keep the faith, love God's people, and always honor the code!
