Marriage Matters

May 2019



This month, we continue our look at the M-A form, also known as the Prenuptial Investigation. It is beyond the scope of this brief newsletter to address every question on the form, but we will look at some of the questions that may require an explanation.

Impotence - The question concerning a physical defect that would prevent a person from performing the physical marriage act refers solely and exclusively to permanent, physical impotence. question arises due to the fact that an essential end of marriage is procreation; thus a person who is incapable of acts that are per se apt for the generation of children is incapable of validly marrying. Note that the impotence in question must be physical, not psychological, permanent, that is, there is no possible cure for condition. If there is any doubt regarding the nature of impotence or the possibility of a cure, then the pastoral minister should err on the side of the person's right to marry (canons 843 §1 & 1058) and consider the person free of the impediment.

Impediments – In the Diocese of Erie, pastoral ministers are highly unlikely to encounter any of the impediments listed under this question. If you do, please contact the tribunal to discuss the issue to make sure that it is in fact an impediment and what, if anything, can be done about it.

Conditions – The question concerning any conditions, restrictions, or reservations that the parties may be attaching to their consent to the marriage goes to the marital obligation permanence. The presence of a condition in and of itself may not make a person's consent invalid. The real question is whether the person is reserving the right to him or herself to end the marriage if the condition is not met. For example, a person agrees to marry someone on condition that he or she maintains a certain income level, fully intending that, should the person fail to maintain that level, then the person placing the condition will leave the marriage and greener pastures elsewhere. If either party is attaching a condition to his or her consent, the pastoral minister should discuss the issue with him or her and

determine exactly what the person's intention regarding permanence is.

Witnesses Because marriage changes the legal status of the parties involved, canonical form requires the presence of two witnesses who can testify to the fact that the marriage was celebrated according to the norm of law. Witnesses are also important if the validity of the marriage is ever challenged. The only requirements to be a valid witness to a marriage are that the person be at least fourteen years of age and in possession of his or her mental faculties. The M-A form asks for the Best Man and Maid/Matron of Honor because it is assumed that both will be there, but the names of any two valid witnesses who are present suffice.

MEMORIAL OF BERNARDINE OF SIENA, PRIEST

It's good to evolve

Bernardine of Siena (1380-1444) was known as a gifted preacher. But many of his sermons were polemics against Jews and homosexual peoples. The cultural, political, and religious context of his time gave tacit approval to such invective. But Catholic thinking today has evolved. The catechism now teaches that people with same-sex attraction "must be accepted with respect, compassion and sensitivity" (#2358). And, according to the catechism, the church "enjoys a link" with the Jewish people, the "first to hear the word of God" (#839). Do you hold assumptions about others that need to be reexamined?

MEMORIAL OF CHRISTOPHER MAGALLANES, PRIEST, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Dying to find a better way

Christopher Magallanes was a priest in Mexico during a difficult time in Mexican history. On the heels of the Mexican Revolution of 1910-17, the Catholic Church and the Mexican state were at loggerheads. Magallanes wrote and preached against armed rebellion but was falsely accused of promoting armed uprising during what came to be called the Cristero Rebellion. Arrested in 1927 on his way to celebrate Mass, he gave his few possessions -as well as absolution-to his executioners. His last words were, "I die innocent and ask God that my blood may serve to unite my Mexican brethren." Since 1929 church and state in Mexico have by and large avoided further violent conflict and are on much better terms than in the past. Pray for peaceful resolutions to conflicts in the world today.

MEMORIAL OF RITA OF CASCIA, RELIGIOUS

Persist in your faith

Margharita was the only child of a late 14th-century Italian couple. Rita, as she was known, was a 12-year-old bride to a difficult husband, the mother of two sons, and an early widow whose husband was killed in a violent vendetta. Upon the later deaths of her sons, Rita entered the Augustinian monastery in her

hometown of Cascia. Biographers write of her having been a persistent woman of faith who refused to give up a dream of monastic life as well as a peacemaker who reconciled the warring factions that contributed to her husband's death. All agree that she became known as a mystic whose devotion to Christ's suffering produced a wound on her forehead as she ministered to the sick and counseled the steady stream of visitors to the convent. In her memory, let's ask today for grace that empowers us to persistence in faith and peacemaking in relationships.
