JOT Music

You have probably heard the request: "Can't we just have a "quiet" Mass, one without music?" Maybe you asked it yourself! Before Vatican II, it was called a "low" Mass in contrast to the "high" Mass where the choir sang. That distinction is now gone. The revision of the liturgy following Vatican II recovered the understanding that liturgy is inherently musical and that it is the responsibility of the assembly to fully participate. That means singing to the extent we are able—even at daily Mass.

Why such emphasis on music? From the recovery of Gregorian chant in the 1800's and from the time of Pius X's papacy (1903-14) onward, the church has encouraged the participation of the assembly in song. There are at least four basic reasons: First: Music elevates the spoken word to a level of proclamation and celebration. Speaking the Gloria or the Holy is like speaking "Happy birthday to you!" rather than singing it. The force of the words is lost. Besides, the Gloria is a hymn and the Holy is a proclamation of adoration. Singing more deeply connects with the action we are performing than speaking Second: Singing brings a group together and forms a united identity. We witness the power of music to unite all the time, for instance, at a sports event when the fans jump up singing "We will rock you!" Third: Music can strengthen the meaning of words. Think of "Amazing Grace." How does the tune support the sense of the words and reinforce them? Fourth: Music has the ability to communicate something beyond words. We say God is ineffable, that is, indescribable. Music has the ability to touch us on a level beyond words and helps communicate that which is inexpressible.

So, what should we sing at Mass? The basics include the Gospel Acclamation, the Holy,

Memorial Acclamation and the Amen, which should always be sung, even at daily Mass. In 1969 the Vatican put it this way: "[Liturgical] singing means singing the Mass, not just singing during Mass." The U.S. Bishops further clarified this statement in "Sing to the Lord," their 2008 guide on liturgical music. It sets two priorities: acclamations and dialogues. These days most parishes do well singing the acclamations listed above. But we may have forgotten about singing the dialogues between priest and people which were a part of Mass even after Vatican II. Although they may have fallen out of favor, the revised Missal of 2012 calls priests and people to value the dialogues as highly as the acclamations. The Missal is full of musical settings of the texts.

One way to incorporate sung dialogues is simply to sing the text on one note. "The Lord be with you." It's something everyone can do. It stretches out the words and elevates their importance while making participation in the response, "And with your spirit," very easy.

What about all the other songs and hymns at Mass? They have a purpose too. They are to expand on the Scriptural themes of the day and remind us of the themes of the liturgical seasons.

Music touches our hearts and affects our spiritual awareness. It may revive a memory of loss, or love. This makes the work of the music director both easy and more difficult—easier because of the vast choices, more difficult because finding just the right text and tune to engage a specific assembly is a huge challenge.

So, what do you do if singing's not your bag? Try mouthing the words and singing quietly, even on one note. See how that participation changes your experience of the Mass. Do you focus on the text more now? As you arrive at Mass, remember the saying attributed to Augustine: "One who sings, prays twice." Give it a try.

SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Love without distinction

An enemy is defined as someone who's against you. The word springs from the Latin "*inamicus*"—literally, "not friend." If someone's not interested in being your *amigo*, why should you be amicable in return? While contrary to instinct, loving enemies is one of the hallmarks of following Jesus, who chooses to lay down his life even for the sake of those who are killing him. Is it risky to open your arms to an enemy? Yes: see crucifixion, above. But if we refuse to love those who hate us, what makes us any different from those who hate?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23; 1 Corinthians 15:45-49; Luke 6:27-38 (81). "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you."

Monday, Feb 25, 2019

Clean from the inside out

Most people may think they've left behind those old-fashioned notions of "unclean spirits" found in the Bible and religious texts of an earlier age, but have they really? Researchers have found that a lot of ancient associations about "clean" and "unclean" are still with us, only now we have translated them into the realm of science, health, or nutrition. Think of how concerned people are about the purity of their food and whether their environment is antiseptically clean. It's all well and good to promote health and guard against disease, but don't forget Jesus taught that purity and impurity ultimately are questions of the heart.

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 1:1-10; Mark 9:14-29 (341). "Everything is possible to one who has faith."

Tuesday, Feb 26, 2019

The last will be first

"Will you let me be your servant? Let me be as Christ to you." The Richard Gillard hymn with this line has become familiar to many Catholics. Sung at funerals, weddings, Holy Thursday foot washings, and Sunday Mass, the lyrics touch human hearts in their eloquent call to humbly serve the needs of others. Pope Francis, who serves the poor in word and deed, calls us to share in this journey. How can I surrender my need for recognition? How can I serve the needs of others?

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 2:1-11; Mark 9:30-37 (342). "They had been arguing about who was the most important."

Respond to the need, not the creed

In a commentary a few years back, prelate Gerald Kicanas, former bishop of the Diocese of Tucson, addressed the question of whether Catholic organizations are still actually "Catholic" if they provide services to all people, Catholic or not. His response was clear and pastoral: "The heart of Catholic outreach and social doctrine has been that we are here to serve all, and don't make distinctions. So in our Catholic schools there are young people who are non-Catholic. In our Catholic charities, we serve people who are in need." May the measure of your service and outreach always be love. TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 4:11-19; Mark 9:38-40 (343). "There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me."

Gone but not forgotten?

One of the most significant documents the American Roman Catholic bishops issued in the 20th century was *Economic Justice for All*. Issued in 1986, it calls fulfilling the needs of the poor the "highest priority" of economic policy and employment the "most urgent priority for domestic economic policy." Economic rights are fundamental human rights, as much as freedom of speech and religion. Some on Wall Street responded: What can a group of bishops know of high finance? A living Christianity, however, will always speak economic justice to economic power. Speak up for human values as expressed in public budgets.

TODAY'S READINGS: Sirach 5:1-8; Mark 9:41-50 (344). "Anyone who gives you a cup of water to drink because you belong to Christ... will surely not lose his reward."

The graceful gift of friendship

The church's current sacramental system designates seven ritual moments in the life of the church as occasions of particular grace. Any parochial school child can recite them: the initiating sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist; the healing rituals of Reconciliation and Anointing of the Sick; the vocations of Marriage and Holy Orders. But if there's ever room for an eighth candidate, many might vote for a sacrament of friendship. Who hasn't experienced their closest friends as occasions of grace? And didn't Jesus "institute" this sacrament just as obviously in the choice of his companions from Galilee to Jerusalem? Express your gratitude to a friend today.


