You only live once

"Somehow, my heart has been made to hold the world." Sister of Charity Tracy Kemme explains her attraction to religious life with these words. In a book of essays by young women religious, *In Our Own Words: Religious Life in a Changing World*, she and other recently professed sisters describe what it means for them to "go big or go home" in life's great adventure. Kemme quotes T.S. Eliot: "Only those who will risk going too far can possibly find out how far one can go." As Vocation Awareness Week begins, consider how far you're prepared to go.

TODAY'S READINGS: Wisdom 11:22—12:2; 2 Thessalonians 1:11— 2:2; Luke 19:1-10 (153). "We always pray for you, that our God may make you worthy of his calling."

Monday, Nov 04, 2019

MEMORIAL OF CHARLES BORROMEO, BISHOP Out-of-synch saint

With Vocation Awareness Week underway, we celebrate the 16th-century Italian Charles Borromeo, who was pretty sure of his vocation by the age of 12. As he grew in understanding of who he was called to be, he gave away his wealth and dedicated himself to service of the poor. He was made a cardinal by his uncle, Pope Pius IV. After that, in order to become the archbishop of Milan, he was ordained a priest. (An unusual sequence but possible at that time.) A zealous reformer of the church, he died at the age of 43 but was made a saint 26 years later. All are called to serve and to the sainthood of all believers. Consider your own vocation—have you found it yet?

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 11:29-36; Luke 14:12-14 (485). "When you hold a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind."

Tuesday, Nov 05, 2019

It starts with a good word

Did you know that a surprising number of sisters, brothers, and priests say that they first considered a vocation to religious life simply because someone—a teacher, friend, or relative suggested it to them? Did someone point out to you early in life that you'd be good at sales or carpentry or design—or whatever it is you now do for a living? Do the same for a young person you know, if you see in them qualities that would suit them to religious life. You might be planting the seed of a future vocation.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 12:5-16b; Luke 14:15-24 (486). "Go out to the highways and hedgerows and make people come in that my home may be filled."

Wednesday, Nov 06, 2019

Hold things lightly

Today is the middle of National Vocation Awareness Week, a good time for people from all walks of life to consider their calling. At the same time, today's gospel does not soften a hard message that no matter our calling, all disciples should hold lightly to both family and possessions. While the vows and promises priests, sisters, and brothers make involve renunciation of possessions and often mean less family contact, Christians in every walk of life may be required to turn from family and let go of belongings at some point. In your prayer today, consider what sacrifices your life path has required—and what joys it has brought you.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 13:8-10; Luke 14:25-33 (487). "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple."

Thursday, Nov 07, 2019

Go ahead, be a loser!

Even though the U.S. Catholic Church is promoting Vocation Awareness Week—for vocations to the priesthood and religious life—it's also an opportunity for everyone to reflect upon their own vocation in life, to re-examine their larger philosophy of life. While it's true that Jesus uses parables that describe the joy of finding lost things—the shepherd who searches for one of 100 sheep, the woman who scours her home for one of 10 coins— Jesus also says we must lose our life to keep it. Who, me? A martyr? Not necessarily. But in a world that fosters selfcenteredness, we can practice acts of self-sacrifice. Some even call it "dying before we die," the "white martyrdom" of saints in heaven—but also the saints who live nearby.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 14:7-12; Luke 15:1-10 (488). "None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself."

Friday, Nov 08, 2019

Let the Spirit guide you

Jesus promised his disciples that after he left this earth, his Spirit would continue to be with them. Those who believe in Jesus and try to live as he did are the disciples of today. So when we struggle with a problem, face a difficult decision, or are worried about life's events, we too can count on the Spirit of Jesus, God's Holy Spirit, for wisdom and consolation. Any and every day is the time to call on the promised Spirit. Take a moment in quiet prayer today to ask God's Spirit to lead you through the day.

TODAY'S READINGS: Romans 15:14-21; Luke 16:1-8 (489). "I will not dare to speak of anything except what Christ has done through me. . . by the power of God's Spirit."

FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA

The grace of sacred space

It's not every day in the life of the church that we have a feast day for a building. But Saint John Lateran is not about a history set in stone. The feast we celebrate today is a feast of the living church: our life in Jesus the Christ and our life with the whole communion of saints.
