

The Preface at Mass **Popular Saints in March**

The most important prayer at Mass is the

Eucharistic Praver when the simple gifts of bread and wine are prayed over and become the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. In order to properly prepare ourselves for the grace of this prayer, we begin with a dialogue between the priest and the people. This dialogue and the prayer that follows is called the Preface.

Priest: The Lord be with you. People: And with your spirit. Priest: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them up to the Lord.

Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right and just.

Let's take the words The Lord be with you. What does this mean? Why does the priest say this to the people? The priest is assuring us that the Lord will be with us as we prepare to hear this Most Sacred Eucharistic Praver.

Also, in the people's response — and with your spirit— the people are assuring the priest that the Lord is with his spirit as he prays this prayer.

In the part of this dialogue the words of the priest-*Lift up your hearts*; the people respond with *we lift them up* to the Lord. The words of Lift up your hearts are actually found in the Bible in the Old Testament in the Book of Lamentations 3:4 — "Let us lift up our hearts and hands to God in heaven." The heart is emphasized here. But why? Dr. Ed Sri explains: "In the Bible, the heart is the center of the person from which thoughts, emotions and actions originate. All intentions and commitments flow from the human heart. Therefore, when the priest at Mass says 'Lift up your hearts', he is summoning us to give our fullest attention to what is about to unfold. This is a wake-up call to set aside all others concerns and focus our mind, will, and emotions — our heart— on the sublimity of what is happening in the Eucharistic Prayer." (Dr. Ed Sri, The Mass, page 228)

The priest concludes with *Let us give thanks to the* Lord our God. The word Eucharist means giving thanks. Therefore, it is appropriate that we start expressing our thanksgiving now at Mass with the words *It is right and just.* It certainly is right and just to thank God throughout the day and EVERYDAY!

St. Patrick: This popular saint is actually the Patron Saint of our Diocese as well as the Patron Saint of Ireland. The first cathedral in our Diocese was named after St. Patrick. Sometime later St. Peter Cathedral was built and became our diocesan cathedral.

St. Patrick is well-known for bringing the Christian faith to Ireland. In his famous writings—<u>Confessio</u>—he expresses a humble gratefulness in all God has done for him. Pictures depict him with a shamrock which he used to explain the Blessed Trinity.

St. Joseph—our Patron Saint was a *just and humble man* who always obeyed the Will of God. St. Joseph, pray for us that we, too, will do God's Will in our lives. Amen.

Groups or individuals wishing to have information published in the bulletin are asked to submit the information in writing, by email or by phone by Monday at 10:00 a.m.

SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION

Baptism – A baptism preparation session is required of all parents wishing to have their child(ren) baptized. Parents must be registered parishioners. Sessions are held periodically at parishes throughout the Deanery. It is always preferred that baptisms be celebrated during a regular Sunday Liturgy. Call the Parish office for more information.

Eucharist – Children preparing for Eucharist (Gr. 3) and who are active in the Faith Formation process (including Catholic School children) are eligible to enter the sacramental preparation sessions.

Confirmation – High School youth who are entering the 11th grade and who are active in the Faith Formation process or attend a Catholic High School since 9th grade are eligible to enter the Confirmation preparation sessions.

R.C.I.A. – Rite of Christian Initiation for adults are initiated into the Church through this process. Any individual who may be interested in becoming a member of the Catholic Church is invited. Please call the Church office.

SACRAMENTS OF VOCATION

Priesthood/Permanent Deaconate – Men who feel that they may be being called to the vocational life of Priesthood or Deaconate can contact the pastor at any time or call the Diocesan Vocation Office at 814-824-1111.

Matrimony – There is a required preparation process which normally includes 3 sessions with the pastor and an Engagement Encounter or Nova experience. Please notify the pastor at least 6 months prior to the anticipated date of marriage.

SACRAMENTS OF HEALING

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick-Celebrated for all who are seriously ill annually at a parish Liturgy. The Sacrament is also available upon request.

Reconciliation – The sacrament is celebrated weekly on Saturday from 4:45 – 5:15 p.m, or anytime by request. Parish Penance services are celebrated during Advent and Lent. Children preparing for Reconciliation (Gr. 2) and who are active in the Faith Formation process (including Catholic School children) are eligible to enter the sacramental preparation sessions.
