

The Power of Words

Words always had and will continue to be a powerful and effective way of communication. The use of words in describing things, people, places, facts, truths, and experiences can touch our deepest emotions, intellect and imagination.

If I were to describe a beautiful winter day, the sun shining in a bright, blue sky, snow on the ground with the branches of each tree encircled with a beautiful glaze of ice and snow, you would be able to see it in your mind and perhaps the exact place where you last saw that description of nature's artwork. Words have a way of taking us there. So does God's Word take us there. Where, you might ask? To the happiness of eternal life that begins here and now and the power of the Holy Spirit you have within you now.

The First Reading from the Book of Nehemiah and the Gospel from Luke are about reading and listening to God's Word as recorded in the Sacred Scriptures. The head of the people Nehemiah and his priest/scribe, Ezra encouraged the down-trodden people after reading from the Book of the Law by saying to them ... "Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the Lord must be your strength." (Neh 8:10b) The people of God were able to freely imagine this joy.

In a like manner in our Gospel Reading Jesus returned "to Nazareth, where He had grown up" (Luke 4:16a). He read from the Prophet Isaiah the words that would begin to be Jesus's own mission statement:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He has anointed Me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord" (Luke 4:18-19) The people in Nazareth were happy to hear these words. They were able to freely imagine this Good News.

SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION

Baptism – A baptism preparation session is required of all parents wishing to have their child(ren) baptized. Parents must be registered parishioners. Sessions are held periodically at parishes throughout the Deanery. It is always preferred that baptisms be celebrated during a regular Sunday Liturgy. Call the Parish office for more information.

Eucharist – Children preparing for Eucharist (Gr. 3) and who are active in the Faith Formation process (including Catholic School children) are eligible to enter the sacramental preparation sessions.

Confirmation – High School youth who are entering the 11th grade and who are active in the Faith Formation process or attend a Catholic High School since 9th grade are eligible to enter the Confirmation preparation sessions.

R.C.I.A. – Rite of Christian Initiation for adults are initiated into the Church through this process. Any individual who may be interested in becoming a member of the Catholic Church is invited. Please call the Church office.

SACRAMENTS OF VOCATION

Priesthood/Permanent Deaconate – Men who feel that they may be being called to the vocational life of Priesthood or Deaconate can contact the pastor at any time or call the Diocesan Vocation Office at 814-824-1111.

Matrimony – There is a required preparation process which normally includes 3 sessions with the pastor and an Engagement Encounter or Nova experience. Please notify the pastor at least 6 months prior to the anticipated date of marriage.

SACRAMENTS OF HEALING

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick-Celebrated for all who are seriously ill annually at a parish Liturgy. The Sacrament is also available upon request. Reconciliation - The sacrament is celebrated weekly on Saturday from 4:45 - 5:15 p.m, or anytime by request. Parish Penance services are celebrated during Advent and Lent. Children preparing for Reconciliation (Gr. 2) and who are active in the Faith Formation process (including Catholic School children) are eligible to enter the sacramental preparation sessions.
