
Dear Friends in Christ:

Deacon's Corner

September 5, 2021

This weekend we celebrate the Labor Day Holiday. It is the last three-day weekend and official holiday of the summer. It is appropriate to celebrate our labors, and there are quite a few writings and documents from the Church on the subject.

At the end of the 19th century, the Church began writing on the dignity of work and workers' rights. These documents considered the right to a just wage, decent work, safe working conditions, association, disability protection, security in retirement, and economic initiative.

Among the first documents was the encyclical *On the Condition of Labor (Rerum Novarum)* Pope Leo XIII wrote in 1891. It discusses the distinctiveness of the human being, the duties of workers and employers, the protection of rights by the State, and payment of just wages.

Pope St. John Paul II also wrote another encyclical titled, *On Human Work (Laborem Exercens)* in 1981. It talks about that work is a fundamental part of the individual's existent on earth. As described in the book of Genesis, every individual takes part in the giant process of building the earth through labor. Work is for the person and not the person for the work. The worker should never be seen solely as an instrument of production. There should be respect for every kind of work and worker: manual or intellectual, industrial or agricultural, and at home or out in the workplace.

This weekend enjoy your rest just as God rested from his labor after the creation of the World.



7 Days of Wisdom by Fulton Sheen

September 5

In moments when fever, agony, and pain make it hard to pray, the suggestion of prayer that comes from merely holding the rosary-or better still, from caressing the Crucifix at the end of it~is tremendous!

September 6

The fact the enemies of God must face is that modern civilization has conquered the world, but in doing so has lost its soul. And in losing its soul it will lose the very world it gained...And as religion fades so will freedom, for only where the spirit of God is, is there liberty.

September 7

Love of self without love of God is selfishness; love of neighbor without love of God embraces only those who are pleasing to us, not those who are hateful.

September 8

Conversion can also occur among those who already have the faith. Christians will become real Christians, with less facade and more foundation. Catastrophe will divide them from the world, force them to declare their basic loyalties; it will revive shepherds who shepherd rather than administrate, reverse the proportion of saints and scholars in favor of saints, create m ore reapers for the harvest, more pillars of fire for the lukewarm; it will make the rich see that real wealth is in the service of the needy; and , above all else, it will make the glory of Christ's Cross shine out in a love of the brethren for one another as true and loval sons of God.

September 9

Love of God thus becomes the dominant passion of life; like every other worth-while love, it demands and inspires sacrifice. But love of God and man, as an ideal, has lately been replaced by the new ideal of tolerance which inspires no sacrifice. Why should any human being in the world be merely tolerated? What man has ever made a sacrifice in the name of tolerance? It leads men, instead, to express their own egotism in a book or a lecture that patronizes the downtrodden group. One of the cruelest things that can happen to a human being is to be tolerated. Never once did Our Lord say, "tolerate your enemies!" But He did say, "love your enemies: do good to them that hate you" (Matt. 5:44). Such love can be achieved only if we deliberately curb our fallen nature's animosities.

September 10

If we use our lives for other purposes than those given by God, not only do we miss happiness, but we actually hurt ourselves and beget in us queer little "kinks."

September 11

It is not easy to explain why God permits evil; but it is impossible for an atheist to explain the existence of goodness. How could a spiritless, soul-les, cross-less, Godless universe become the center of faith, purity, sacrifice, and martyrdom? How can decency be the decent thing if there is no God? Since God is love, why should we be surprised that want of it should end in pain, hate, broken hearts, and war?

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary September 8th

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, refers to a Christian feast day celebrating the birth of Mary, mother of Jesus.

The modern canon of scripture does not record Mary's birth. The earliest known account of Mary's birth is found in the Protoevangelium of James (5:2), an apocryphal text from the late second century, with her parents known as Saint Anne and Saint Joachim.

In the case of saints, the Church commemorates their date of death, with Saint John the Baptist and the Virgin Mary as the few whose birth dates are commemorated. The reason for this is found in the singular mission each had in salvation history, but traditionally also because these alone were holy in their very birth (for Mary, the Immaculate Conception; John was sanctified in Saint Elizabeth's womb according to the traditional interpretation of Luke 1:15).
