

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

From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:

Last week I reflected on Jesus' humanity, which is intimately linked and inseparable from His divinity. Just as we should often mediate on the "normal" and "ordinary" moments of Jesus' human life – just as He experienced life as we do today in our human condition – we too should turn our thoughts to the supernatural and extraordinary moments of His divine existence. Like Jesus' human moments, for instance growing up as a teenage Jewish boy in Nazareth, many of His divine moments are hidden from us in the sacred scriptures. No one recorded Jesus and Joseph in the carpenter's workshop, just as there is no biblical picture of the actual moment of the Resurrection. Yet it is these "in between the verses of the Bible" that much prayer and meditation can be spent.

My favorite depiction of the Resurrection is an Eastern Orthodox icon called *The Descent into Hell*. There Jesus has gone down into the abyss to free the souls who's entrance into heaven were blocked since the gates were locked when Adam and Even first allowed sin to enter into our humanity there in the Garden of Eden. The icon shows Jesus, with the broken locks and keys of heaven at His feet, with two elderly and obviously weak people coming out of the darkness – a man and woman. The man is Adam and the woman is Eve. The first two humans created, now being saved and redeemed by the One who is true God and true Man. Thought not in the Bible, this depiction makes it clear – that He who was born as one of us, lived as one of us, died as one of us – truly was and is (as the centurion observed with the shadow of the Cross) the Divine Son of God!



The Divinity of Jesus is not just a fancy law that all Christians have to believe in, it is essential and above all, it is beautiful! Think for just a moment: God loves humanity so much that when Adam and Eve sinned and original sin tainted the whole of the human race's souls, God Himself became human to later give himself as a sacrifice for your sins and my sins. There hanging on the wood of the Cross, the second person of the Trinity – God in His human form – the man Jesus of Nazareth, to whom countless people called teacher and Lord, to whom we call Savior and Redeemer. The only way this could come to it's completion on Easter Sunday was that God would become one of us – BUT never loosing what God gave Him – His divine life. Both true God and true Man.

As Saint Paul put it: "For our sake He made Him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God." (2 Corinthians 5:21). Therefore, not only is the reality of the Trinity and Jesus' two natures required for us to believe, not only is it beautiful, all of our Salvation is dependent upon the FACT that Jesus is God.

Christianity can, to some extent, be summed up by a single, seemingly paradoxical dictum given by Saint Athanasius: "God became human that humans might become God." Our earthly bodies, which were never a possession, but a gift – a gift in process, are changing into a magnificent eternity. This is what the Resurrection is – life continuing – life transforming. The Resurrection is the fulfillment of our earthly lives, not their annihilation – not their end. Our most ardent desire here on earth must be that we want to experience the love of God, the love of neighbor – both in a degree of intimacy that we cannot yet begin to fathom. God desired that union of love and thus sent us His Son. Jesus' humanity and divinity show forth in such a splendid way the beauty of God.

As John's gospel begin, so may I conclude my thoughts with you about Jesus' beautiful humanity and divinity. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth; we have beheld his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father." This is one of the most well-known biblical proofs of Jesus' two natures. Jesus is eternal (here, "beginning" means "eternity past"). He was with God the Father, and is God the Son. To make sure we have no misunderstanding, John says to us again that the "Word" referred to is the Son,

and notes that He "became flesh" (the Incarnation). Only the Son has a body. The Word = Jesus = God. How simple it is and always has been. Yes, how beautiful!
