

From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:

Sometimes, Jesus isn't where we expect him to be. Which leads us to ask, in a more personal way: with the holidays "ending," and the sentiment of the season fading, what is left? Where is Jesus in our lives? Epiphany is certainly not a time to put away Christ.

This is a time to remember what his coming meant to our world – and to hold on to the sense of charity, and generosity, and wonder, and joy that are all the hallmarks of the Christmas season. How many times last month did we hear the phrase, "Keep Christ in Christmas?" Well, that's just the beginning. We need to keep him in every day, in every season.

So this weekend...remember. Remember what we felt over the last two weeks. Remember why Christ came into the world. Remember that what began in a manger ended on a cross. Remember the One who is at the center of it all. And remember: God's entrance in human history — the event we celebrated two Sundays ago — changed everything. And continues to change us now!

Two thousand and eighteen years ago, Jesus was marginalized in his birth—pushed aside into a stable. He shouldn't be marginalized in our lives today. Now that the celebration of his birth has ended, Christ's presence in our lives shouldn't be discarded or forgotten about, like a Christmas tree left at the curb.

The question of the magi is the question all of us have to answer – and answer for. Not just this Sunday, Epiphany, but every day. Where is the newborn king of the Jews? Where have we put Jesus in our world? Does the world even recognize Him anymore? If not, you and I must show the world the Baby of Bethlehem is reflected in our faces – our hands – our voices – our actions. Where is Jesus? In our hearts is where!

Saint John Paul II rightly observed: "The Epiphany is the great feast of faith. Both those who have already arrived at faith, and those who are on the way to arrive at it, take part in this feast. They take part, rendering thanks for the gift of faith, just as the Magi Kings, full of gratitude, knelt before the Child. The Church, which becomes more aware of the vastness of her mission every year, takes part in this feast. To how many people it is still necessary to bring faith! How many must be won back to the faith, which they have lost, and that is sometimes more difficult than the first conversion to faith! Nevertheless, the Church, aware of that great gift, the gift of the incarnation of God, can never stop, can never tire. She must continually seek access to Bethlehem for every man and for every period. The Epiphany is the feast of God's challenge."

Am I up to the challenge? Are you?

God loves you!

This one is the most straightforward - gold symbolizes the Kingship of Christ. "Myrrh is mine: its bitter perfume breathes a life of gathering gloom." Myrrh is an embalming spice. Already at Christ's birth, we have the symbolic reminder of his death. "Frankincense to offer have I. Incense owns a deity nigh." In many religious traditions, incense symbolizes prayers rising to heaven. In some pagan traditions, it is thought to help "call down" the deity. The
